Trade With Spain Increasing.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 21.—The details of American trade with Spain in the last fiscal year are exceedingly interesting, since they show a marked growth both as to imports from and exports to Spain since the war. A comparison of the conditions in 1905 with those of 1897, the last year prior to the war with Spain, according to the official just published, shows that imports into the United States from that country have increased from \$3,500,000 to \$5,500,000, and the exports from the United States to Spain have increased from \$11,900,000 to \$17,000,000, speaking in round numbers. The principal articles imported from Spain are fruits and nuts, sulphur, ore, cork, wines and vegetables. Fruits and nuts are by far the largest items in the imports from Spain, amounting in 1905 to considerably more than \$3,000,000 out of a total importation of \$5,500,000 from that country. Of this total of more than \$3,000,000 worth of fruit and nuts, almonds amounted to \$885,254, preserved and prepared fruits \$664,490; raisins, \$196,100, while olives and grapes formed the bulk of the remainder.

The largest exports to Spain are raw cotton, which amounted in 1905 to more than \$12,725,000; tobacco, unmanufactured, \$813,855; crude mineral oil, \$642,829; shoes, staves and headings, \$427,257; boards, \$296,563; iron and steel manufactures, \$297,544, and leather and manufactures thereof, \$246,869.

The trade in Spain in 1905, both as to exports and imports, was larger than in any preceding year in the history of our trade with that country.

Springfield, Ill., Feb. 21.—The ninth annual meeting of the National Mine Managers and Assistants' Mutual Aid association opened here today at the state house. One vote is allowed in the convention for every seven members, or fraction thereof, in each local. The executive council of the national body is composed of Jonathan Foster, Bonanza, Ark.; John F. Nuttall, Four Mile, Ky.; Thomas Hannah, Bloomer, Ill.; Joseph Henderson, Coal City, Ill.; Tom Moses, Westville, Ill.; John E. Williams, Springfield, Ill.; John W. White, Bellville, L., and Thomas Roe, Orchard Mines, Ill. The attendance at the convention is very large and some highly important matters will come up for consideration and discussion.
