A National Temperance Movement.

During the past summer and winter the officials of the Baden railroads in Germany resorted to the practice of serving hot coffee to their employees at the expense of the management of the railroads. The experiment has been attended with gratifying results. The consumption of alcoholic drinks has materially decreased as a result of the practice, and the efficiency of the workmen has increased. It has been observed that the employees have performed their various duties more cheerfully and have been more faithful in the discharge of the same. This has been especially noticeable among the workmen in the various freight departments. The powers of endurance have notably increased. There were also fewer accidents to the employees as they had better command of their faculties. In consequence of the beneficial results of the experiment the railroad officials have decided to serve non-alcoholic drinks to the employees on all the Baden railroads during the present winter.

The practice of serving hot coffee and meat broth to the employees of the Prussian railroads has been in practice for some time in the freight department, especially where the men are obliged to make long runs. On some lines hot and cold drinks are sold to employees at the reasonable price of 2 pfennigs (1/4 cent) per portion of coffee or tea or for a bottle of mineral water. On some of the lines in Germany the employees have been forbidden to take any alcoholic drinks while on duty. In consequence of the increased number of English and French speaking tourists, the railway employees in Bavaria, such as station masters, ticket collectors, guards and porters, are obliged to learn English and French in order to facilitate travel during the tourist season. Scholarships are to be given to those who make the most progress, and the successful student will be sent at the expense of the railway management for a holiday in England to complete his studies.—Consul Brittain of Kohl.

Duty of the Church.

(Baker City Daily Herald.) The Portland press is just now busy engaged in detailing the incidents of a dirty political wrangle which is in progress between certain churches and certain politicians and political movements. Certain churches have attempted

to force a stand on certain questions pertaining to the regulation of the city and have declared themselves a unit in a political faction.

To the average churchman or layman this procedure is not received with favor. It is no part of the duty of a church as a public institution to come out as a unit in political wrangles and take a stand on this or that question. Churches are our greatest institutions, they are the safeguard of our religious and moral liberty, they are the pioneers in progress and development and keep our community on a higher plane of civilization. But they are not political factors or units.

The duty of the church is to teach the laws of humanity and life to its members, instruct them in the way they should go, give them honest and unbiased counsel, point out to them the higher things in life to strive for and the rewards of a good, honorable and Christian life. The church is a teacher and not a master. It does not wield the whip of the slave driver nor the powers of an executive. Its duty is to inculcate within the hearts of its members the great and noble principles of noble men and women and then leave the members to put these teachings into practice.

It is meet and proper that the pastor of the church should discourse to his congregation upon political or moral themes which stir the nation, state or municipality, but he should not attempt to force his followers and his church into the fight as a unit. It is by teaching the great moral philosophy of Christ and by singing the great Christian symphony that the church has fought its way triumphant through the two thousand years of wars, persecutions and vicissitudes to the place of the conqueror. Its history is noble because of the great principles upon which it is founded, but when it drops to the plane of sexual political wrangles it loses its great power and the great homage which our forefathers, and their fathers before them back to the time of the lowly Nazarene, paid it. It is a higher respect and a deeper conviction with which we regard the church than with which we regard political squabbles and party factions.

Most churches cling to this high ideal and teach the beautiful life of the Christ until their following becomes upright, honorable and worthy citizens. But now and then a church falls through misinstruction and in-

competent leadership. Then instead of lifting up the fallen it drags down those who were being lifted up.

ANTI-FOREIGN CHINA.

National Feeling Growing Against the Japanese.

Late reports received from the Orient indicate that the Japanese are now being included in the Chinese anti foreign movement. The Japanese have been strongly suspected of having inspired the Young Chinese Reform or Progressive party to start the movement originally, because in the Shanghai riots and elsewhere where anti foreign disturbances have occurred recently in China it was noted that the Japanese were not molested. Indeed, one newspaper correspondent represented that Japanese were observed to fraternize with the rioters at Shanghai.

Japanese correspondents at Peking are now reporting that an anti Japanese feeling is growing throughout China, which, if true, indicates that the Manchus, who have not cherished any special friendship for the Japanese, have aroused a counter popular sentiment to that fostered by the Young Progressive party, in which the little brown men are included in the movement against foreigners. Prominent Chinese officials are said to be beginning to show considerable irritation over the continued influx of Japanese into Manchuria and Mongolia during the past few months, and Cantonese writers have recently issued an aggressive manifesto, in which they assert that the real menace to China's integrity lies in Japan. The latter's action in the seizure of Corea is interpreted by Chinese politicians as indicating the adoption by the Japanese of an aggressive policy which forbodes no good for their own country.

Assuming that the Japanese secretly plotted with the Progressives in China to stir up anti foreign feeling in which they were not intended to be included, the counter anti foreign sentiment, in which the Japanese are embraced, which has been apparently aroused by the other faction of the Chinese people, may be the means of turning the tables on the plotters and involving Japan in another war with China, and that subsequent events will confirm the conviction of the Cantonese literati that she is the real menace to the integrity of the empire. If another war should be started with Japan, as a result of the anti foreign movement, it will be made quite plain that the Japanese will take the initiative toward the partitioning of China, although they entered into the late war with Russia with the profession that it was for the purpose of preserving her integrity.—San Francisco Chronicle.
