A large American flag was presented to the Auburn public schools in the East suburb of Salem Thursday at 2 o'clock. There were hundreds of little flags in evidence. There were pictures of Washington, Lincoln and Roosevelt.

The program of exercises was very elaborate, including singing and spelling, reading and acting, and winding up with a grand open-air demonstration when the flag was mounted on the flagstaff that had been provided. The air was rent with singing of the "Red, White and Blue," three cheers for the flag, and to crown all the beauty of the occasion heaven smiled, the sun shone and the most beautiful rainbow of the season spanned the eastern sky. There were nearly 200 present, including the little ones.

Uncle Sam Is Not Honest.

While Uncle Sam is going after land frauds he should look around him, and see if he is not as guilty as those he is prosecuting. Years ago many men took up land under the pre-emption act. The writer was one of them. This land being in the limits of the Northern Pacific land grant, the settlers paid Uncle Sam \$2.50 an acre for it. The Northern Pacific did not build the road and after a time the land was forfeited to the government, but before this time hundreds of men had paid \$2.50 an acre for the land, while those not making proof until after the forfeiture paid \$1.25. Uncle Sam had the settlers' extra \$1.25 per acre for twenty years or more in many instances, and so far the settlers have been unable to get it back. As President Roosevelt is righting all the wrongs of the people, we call his special attention to this matter.—Arlington Record.

The Portage Did It.

The Portland dispatches announcing the reduction of 30 cents per ton, on the wheat rate from the inland empire to Portland, says this reduction is made to offset the cheaper ocean rate from Puget Sound cities, and to induce more growers to ship to Portland.

This is a plausible reason, and will do for newspaper purposes, but there is a deeper and more vital reason for this freight reduction than this published reason.

The presence of the portage road and the opening of the upper Columbia river to traffic have forced down the rate on wheat. This is the hidden reason for the reduction of the rate, and is a direct result of the building of the portage.

Since the same ocean rates have been in effect for years, and since the conditions of shipping in and out of Portland and the Puget Sound cities are now the same as they have been for years, why should the rate from the inland empire to Portland be reduced? Why has it not been reduced before? Why have the high rates been

charged all these years, when the people had no means of relief?

It is significant that this reduction was not made until after the people's portage was built and in service. It is significant that as long as there was no competition there was no reduction of rates. These are plain business issues which any one can see plainly and denote the intrinsic value of the portage road to the people.

The reduction of 30 cents per ton, it is estimated, will transport free of charge, under the old rate, 1,000,000 bushels of wheat from the inland empire to Portland. It will be an approximate saving in freight of \$8200 on every 1,000,000 bushels shipped from the inland empire to Portland, estimating the average rate from inland empire points at 9 cents per bushel, which is a just average.

This result should stimulate the people of Oregon to maintain the portage. It should be nursed, helped, strengthened, encouraged and made a profitable asset of the state for it will stand as a perpetual menace to railroad combinations in future, for even though the north bank road may be built, mutual agreements may be made by it and competing lines by which rates would be raised were it not for the river highway, which is the people's salvation and hope.—East Oregonian.
