

FRONT STREET OPENED

Portland Council Committee Will Recommend Granting Franchise for Roads

Resolved, That it is the sense of this committee that a franchise for an electric railway be granted down Front street.

This resolution was unanimously adopted by the joint street and judiciary committee of the Portland city council at a special meeting Wednesday afternoon. The committee did not designate which one of the competing companies would be successful.

The council chambers were filled with Portland business men and representative men from every large town in the Willamette valley.

The Willamette Valley Traction company was represented by George B. Moffat, of New York, one of the promoters, Attorney W. E. Thomas and Attorney John McNary, of Salem; the United Railways Company by W. D. Larabee, J. White Evans and Attorney W. T. Muir, and the West Side Belt line by Thomas E. McCusker.

The representatives of the Willamette Valley Traction Company said they had already built four miles of track south from Salem, and spent approximately \$30,000, but if the city of Portland would not give the company a right of way over Front street the road could not and would not be built. They said they were willing to put up a good faith bond immediately the franchise was granted.

J. White Evans, of the United Railways Company, said his company did not need to put up a good faith bond, as the dealings of his people in this city within the last month had shown clearly that they meant business. W. D. Larabee, another member of the company, said that his company intended to build through the Willamette valley, if given the opportunity, and had the money to do it.

Thomas W. McCusker disputed the sincerity of the Willamette Valley Traction Company, saying he believed it a speculative scheme, but he thought the United Railways Company sincere.

W. D. Fenton, attorney for the Southern Pacific, presented a resolution amending the three proposed franchises, which would permit the Southern Pacific using the tracks of the new company north of Davis street to the terminal yard on payment of 5 per cent interest on the cost of construction of the road and a sum agreed upon annually for maintenance and repairs.

HOWARD CATLIN DROWNED

Narrow Escape of Midshipman Fred Perkins Home From Annapolis

About 5 o'clock Thursday evening Howard Catlin and Fred Perkins, both of this city, were boating on the Willamette river in a light canoe, and upset not far from shore. They drifted under the bridge, and Catlin sank to rise no more. Perkins was able to swim nearer to shore, after doing all he could to help Catlin, where he clung to some willows until rescued by Jacob and Harry Moyer, who came to his relief with a boat. He was terribly exhausted, and it took over an hour to resuscitate him from his terrible exhaustion and chill.

Dr. and Mrs. Altman, who were walking on the bridge about 5 o'clock, first saw the boys swimming. The canoe would not carry them, and Perkins tried to get an oar for Catlin to cling to. This latter was encumbered with heavy shoes and much clothing, and both the boys made a heroic struggle for their lives against terrible odds. Perkins must have been a very strong swimmer, to have breaststroken the strong current of the river, which is at a high stage from the continuous rains. Both Catlin and Perkins are rated as good swimmers, the latter having had all the training afforded in that line at the United States naval academy.

The young man drowned was the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Catlin, of this city, aged 20 years, a student of the high school, which was dismissed today in his honor. He was a popular young society leader, baseball player and halfback on the football team. He was a general favorite of a sweet and sunny disposition, beloved of all who knew him, and a young man who would have made his mark in the world in any profession or business career that he might have chosen to enter. The parents have the deepest sympathy of the whole community in their great bereavement.

A reward of \$100 is offered for the recovery of the body, which has been swept down the stream by the great flood tide that prevails. Hugo Brady, an expert in recovering bodies from the water, has been sent for, and, as he has an almost broken record of finding the bodies of persons drowned, the remain a will doubtless be recovered. In a very short time he recovered the body of J. A. Rotan, of this city, who was drowned in the same place about a year ago.

It is learned that the boys started on their disastrous voyage from the boathouse near the flouring mill in a canoe belonging to Fred and Ed. Thivison. It is what was known as a canvas canoe, with a light cedar frame and bottom, which accounts for its not holding them up, or floating with them after it upset.

Prompt Delivery Did It.

According to the New York Sun, an American locomotive works has in process 100 locomotives for Japan, which were intended to be built in Great Britain. Specifications were drawn for British engines. Two American firms were allowed to estimate, in the hope that they would not care to submit prices for only 20 out of the 100 required. The Americans were anxious to get in to Japan and decided to incur large expenditure for special patterns, so they put in a figure for 20 machines, and a lower figure for 100. The British makers were higher, but they had a "pull," and they worked it. It was decided that an order should go to England for 80 machines and to the United States for 20. Then the Japanese decided that the 100 locomotives must be on hand within a certain time. The Americans agreed to put the 100 loco-

He suggested that the proper thing to be done was the student body to appoint a committee to draw up resolutions of sympathy and send them to the parents, to the press and place them on the student body record. Harvey Slater, Ralph Moores and Boss Harding were appointed by the president of the student body, Mr. Earl Eyre to draw up the resolutions. After a few minutes of silence Mr. Powers came to the platform, and said that the only thing to be done seemed to be to adjourn, and dismissed the students for the day. Several of the boys remained after to drape the desk of the departed schoolmate.
