Fearing Serious Riots.

Canton, Feb. 23.—It is understood that the anti foreign element is planning extensive riots against the "foreign devils" in all parts of China for tomorrow and it is feared that the trouble will assume as serious proportions as the Boxer disturbances a few years ago. The agitation against the foreigners has been going on for some time through the agency of the subordinate circles of the Chinese Revolution association and during the last few weeks orders have been passed among the members secretly, directing them to throw off all the foreign elements in the country, starting February 24. Although little has appeared on the surface it is well known in semi-official circles that there is intense excitement brewing among the so called reform element and that any serious outbreak in one place will be the signal for a general rising against the foreigners, which would lead to a terrific massacre of foreigners in all parts of the empire. The provincial authorities seem to be matters with their customary indifference, but it believed that secret preparations have been made by them to protect the foreigners as much as possible and to suppress any uprising that should be attempted tomorrow. Many Europeans have received warning, have sought refuge in the large coast cities, and they are more likely to find aid and protection in the case of

an uprising. The missionaries and their families are remaining at their posts, and there is considerable anxiety concerning their fate in case there should be a general uprising.

New Motor Railway Car.

Philadelphia, Feb. 23.—Officials of the Pennsylvania railroad made another test with the Strang gasoline electric motor car. This car looks from without not unlike the ordinary compartment or parlor car. But in the 12 foot space in one end of the car is a 78 horse power five cylinder gasoline engine, directly connected with an electric generator capable of producing an electric current that will run the car at express train speed. Surplus current from the generator is stored in a storage battery carried under the car. The car will take any grade that the heaviest locomotive will climb, the storage battery offering a reserve for short hauls of extraordinary demands. The test showed that the car was capable of covering on an average of 62 miles an hour.

FOREIGN CAPITAL IN EGYPT

Prior to the British occupation (1882) there were, exclusive of the Suez canal company and two banks not primarily established in Egypt, 12 companies in which foreign capital was invested, namely, one railway, two water, two banking, one telephone, five land and real estate and one milling company. The combined capital of these companies cannot be ascertained. From 1882 to the end of 1887 nine commercial companies with a collective capital of \$5,000,000, were formed. With the exception of two small concerns they were connected with the port and trade of Alexandria. Between 1888 and 1891 three companies, with a capital of \$3,000,000, were floated, one a railway under government guarantee, one a combine of the Alexandria cotton presses, and the third an Alexandria land company. Thus far, therefore, it may be said that foreign commercial capital was concentrated in the port of Alexandria. The interior of the country was avoided.

In the four years (1892-1896) 13 companies, with a total capital of \$30,000,000 were successfully launched for the purposes of interior navigation, tramways, land and other real estate transactions, but Alexandria figured for \$360,000 only. The remaining capital had found its way into the interior. Foreign capital, pure and simple, was still holding aloof. Most of the companies were formed and principally financed by foreign residents, who began to feel some confidence in the political future of their adopted country. The Soudan, and therefore the sources of the Nile, were still in the hands of the Mahdists, and so long as such was the case European financiers shook their heads when schemes for Egyptian development were submitted to them. Even as late as 1897, when Lord Cromer ordered the advance on Khartoum, financiers had so little faith or confidence in Egypt and her possibilities that they actually refused to purchase at cost price of material (about \$4,000,000) the Soudan military railway, although a government guaranty on the capital invested, a monopoly and other advantages were thrown in. In April, 1898, the battle of Atbara was fought, and Lord Kitchener telegraphed to the States for a bridge to span the river. Then the financiers wanted to buy, but could not. In September following the battle of Omdurman was fought, and then foreign capital, on its own initiative, came in with a rush.

Between 1897 and 1898 16 commercial companies were instituted with a capital of \$43,500,000, and by the end of 1904 66 more, with a capital of \$70,000,000, had come in. During the present year 24 new companies, with a capital of \$23,000,000 have already been instituted, and more are in preparation. In a word, during the past few years foreign capital to the amount of \$17 per head of the population has been invested in Egypt, and this figure is in respect of the \$25,000,000 for the Assuan reservoir works, the enormous interests of the Imperial Ottoman Credit Lyonnais and other banks not primarily established for Egyptian business, and private concerns that do not publish balance sheets. I have had, necessarily, to restrict myself to registered companies, but the details I have given may not be without interest.—Consul General Morgan of Cairo, Egypt.

Will Go to the Penitentiary.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 23.—Two army officers are destined to go to the penitentiary next week unless the President uses his pardoning power, which, however, is not probable.

One of the officers is Lieutenant Homer E. Lewis, who will spend 18 months in jail, besides being dismissed from the service. He was found guilty of the charge of having duplicated his pay accounts and of having been engaged in numerous financial irregularities. The other is Lieutenant S. S. Burbank, who goes to jail for 15 months. He married a Filipino while on duty in the Philippine islands and denied the relationship on his return to the United States, where he became engaged to a young woman. He might have escaped with dismissal from the army had it not been discovered that Burbank had apparently made away with some of the company funds and obtained money on false pretenses in Manila. The young man's mother and sister and the young woman to whom he was engaged to be married came to Washington and tried to induce the President to exercise his clemency in the case, but President Roosevelt refused to mitigate the sentence.
