of the Members of the Press Gang Who Were at Salem

Mr. Ryan Snyder was one of the members of the National Editorial association, which organization visited Salem June 25 and on the morning of June 26 passed two hours in this city. This gifted lady, whose home is in Chicago, has issued a book entitled "Land of Promise" on what she saw on that trip from Chicago to the Pacific coast and return. Among

the pleasant things said about Salem is found in the following:

"We breakfasted at Salem, the capital of Oregon and the commercial center for parts of Polk, Yamhill, Linn and Clackamas counties. There are probably 125,000 people now in the immediate patronizing territory. There is room for a million, and all of them would be happy and prosperous. The present generation may see it, too.

"The Oregon penitentiary, asylum for the insane, reform school, deaf mute school, school for the blind, Oregon state fair grounds, general offices—in fact all of the purely state institutions, offices and officers—are located here, being so provided in the state constitution. Near here is the government training school, a school for the Indian youth.

"Salem has a population of about 14,000. It is the pruned center of Oregon. Three quarters of the 150,000

Angora goats of the state are found within a radius of 50 miles. Most of the mohair is marketed here and in Dallas. There is room in the same territory, it is claimed, for a million goats. Goat raising is considered a most profitable and reliable industry.

"The Willamette valley has earned for itself the reputation for raising the best hops in the world. Hop land can be bought from \$30 to \$50 an acre, and good yards in the vicinity yield from 1200 to 1500 pounds and sometimes more, to the acre, which at present prices means a handsome profit to the grower.

AMERICAN HUMOR JADED

Jerome K. Jerome Lays Blame on Sunday Supplements

The English humorist, Jerome K. Jerome, who is here, made some comparisons recently in a lecture at Kansas City. "It seems to me," he said, "that the American people have been surfeited with humor. So many brilliant men have written and joked for so long that they have become jaded. I thought at first that the American sense of humor was radically less subtle than ours in England, but now I know better. It is simply overfed."

"Mark Twain is, I believe, the only living humorist of the old American school and he, like Falstaff, is growing old. But the subtle touch that England likes still, and America liked once, is still his. You laugh with him now, I think, more from a sense of duty than a sense of the ridiculous. You have grown tired and need coarser fare to stimulate your appetite. And I've discovered the cause of it, too. It is the comic supplement of the Sunday papers."

"The Sunday comic is appalling, isn't it—the effort to reduce humor to the terms of the meanest intelligence? Is that one result of democracy, I wonder?"

"Do you know, this country has disappointed me in one way. I expected something different. I thought when I came here that you had gone ahead of us in some things. We are dominated by the aristocracy, and you are ruled by the capitalists. Instead of the people owning the wealth of the country, it is all held by a few men. One man owns all the oil; another one man makes all the railway rates. Some other man owns some other thing that is indispensable to all the people."

"You seem to have started all over again from the beginning. Our barons forced the magna charta from King John, and it seems to me that here the people must force their Magna Charta from the barons."
