The Shanghai Anti-Foreign Riot.

Inasmuch as the European and American population of Shanghai does not exceed 100,000, while the Chinese living in the foreign concessions and the native city number more than 500,000 the consequences of anything like a general foreign uprising might be disastrous in the extreme, and it was therefore with a feeling of intense apprehension and alarm that the foreign residents of the settlement went for their weapons. The Shanghai volunteers, a local militia organization numbering 600 or 800 men, assembled hastily, with rifles and bandoliers of cartridges but without uniforms; messengers were dispatched to all the warships in the river, asking for help; squads of Sikh police were sent to check the march of the rioters down Nanjing road and to seize and hold the bridges over Szechow creek; and every European or American who had

a rifle or shot gun, a Mauser pistol or a revolver, rushed into the street and either reported to the municipal authorities for orders or hastened to the scene of disturbance to fight independent ends.

Before 9 o'clock the whole native quarter was swarming like a disturbed ant hill, and it is not an exaggeration, perhaps, to say that within the limits of the central district, between Defense creek and the bund, there were 200,000 excited Chinese in the streets. It soon became apparent, however, that nine-tenths of these people were not participating in the riot, and that the few thousands who were actively engaged in it lacked cohesive organization and courage. They would yell frantically, throw stones, loot and undefended shop or malt a Sikh policeman to death with bamboo poles, but when the volunteers opened fire on them with ball cartridges they lost their nerve and gave way. They did not venture to kill a European outright, even when they had him in their power. If they happened to catch an Englishman alone and unarmed they stopped him, smashed his carriage or motorcycle, and perhaps beat him, but they always stopped short of murder. The only foreigners actually killed were Sikh policemen from India, whom the Chinese hate with a deadly hatred. Between 9 and 10 o'clock in the forenoon strong landing parties of marines and bluejackets came ashore from the British cruisers Astrea and Bonaventure, the Italian cruiser Marco Polo, the German gunboat Vandalier and the British gunboat Olio, and, with a dozen or more machine guns took positions in front of the consulates and public buildings, or marched in squads

You can do that easily if you take pains with the feed given to the hens. Scraps are all right occasionally, but they won't give results. A hen needs a properly balanced ration and if

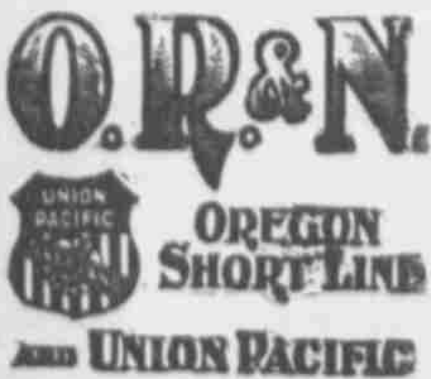
