NEW YORK'S CUSTOM HOUSE

Said to Be the Finest Granite Building in the World

"The finest carved granite building in the world" was the verdict of an eminent French architect after he had critically inspected the imposing facade, stretching nearly 200 feet along Bowling Green, and running 280 feet in depth.

The exterior walls are built of massive granite blocks, backed by several feet of brick work and two inches of fireproof terra cotta, making a wall nine feet thick. In the center of the building is a covered court, with its highly ornamented dome surrounded by colonnades rising to the height of four stories.

Inside the building two rows of heavy steel columns run around the entire structure, thirty feet back from the outer walls. One end of the girders carrying the floors rests upon these columns and the other end is embedded in the masonry wall. In this day of "fire proof" buildings, which are not fire proof at all, the architects gave special attention to the form of construction. It was felt that a building of such importance should be absolutely unburnable. The result of this special study was a decision to fireproof the entire building with hollow tile blocks which in their manufacture had been subjected to a temperature of 3000 degrees for several weeks. The average building fire develops about 1500 degrees of heat, so it can be seen that there is a considerable margin of safety here. Over windows and cornices, where the architectural effect required it, especially designed terra cotta blocks are placed. All the partitions, inner wall linings, and the mansard roof are constructed of hollow tile blocks and

In the circuit court of Marion county, department No. 2, the suit of A. Bush and A. N. Bush, of Ladd & Bush, against Charles Scott, Lulu Scott, the Bank of Woodburn, Coolidge & McClane, of Silverton, Capital National Bank, et al., was begun today.

Plaintiff alleges Charles Scott and Lulu Scott secured payment of a promissory note of \$1039.57 March 13, 1903, by giving a mortgage on property and fixtures of the Woodburn roller flouring mill, and asks that premises be sold by sheriff and proceeds be applied to the payment of the amount due plaintiffs.
