T. B. KAY MAKES STATEMENT

Announcing His Candidacy for the State Senate

Salem, Or., Feb. 28, 1906.

To the Voters of Marion County:

I hereby announce myself as a candidate on the Republican ticket, at the primary election on April 20th, for nomination for the office of state senator.

If nominated and elected, I will support measures for the purpose of raising revenues by indirect taxation.

I will, as I always have, work for a reduction of the number of state normal schools and the appropriations for the same.

I will, as I always have, work against the abuses of employing useless and unnecessary clerks in the legislature.

In fact, I will, to the best of my judgment, endeavor to transact the business of the state in the same careful manner that I do my own.

I will carry out the will of my constituents to the best of my knowledge and belief, especially when made known to me by their direct vote.

On the above statements and supported by my record in the last two sessions, I most respectfully solicit the suffrage of the voters of Marion county.

Interview With Kay.

Mr. Kay does not expect to make any speeches in the primary campaign, but later he will give considerable space to discussion of the political situation.

He will file his statement of candidacy next week. It is his intention to support the choice of the people for the United States senate. There might be contingencies under which he would want to exercise his own judgment on this matter. But he thinks nineteen times out of twenty he would be found voting for the popular choice.

The Cause of Temperance.

Every little while we learn of some boy who has been promised a certain sum upon his twenty-first or twenty-fifth birthday or even yearly, the sole condition being abstinence from alcohol, tobacco or both. The average boy will work for such a prize as a matter of course, and it will tide him over the period in which alcohol does the most harm. If it is really true that abstinence until 25 insures a life of sobriety, by all means let the scheme be extended to more boys until it becomes fashionable. Boys are sticklers for custom and will shun drink as soon as it becomes bad form. Happily, it is a method which cannot possibly do harm even if it is not based upon a true hypothesis—and its possibilities of good seem so largely that it would be criminal not to try it. Should the early incidence of alcoholism really mean that it is due to a pathologic nervous instability—and there is no reason to believe it to be so called except in the minority of cases—then the boy is apt to be abnormal any way, if not alcoholically then in some other habit. Yet it is reasonable to believe that many of these cases, after a few years of right living with good food, might become sufficiently stable to be in no further danger, and then they could indulge moderately, or not, as they please. Perhaps, also much of the disease is due to poor nourishment in infancy and childhood, so that there are things to be done besides inducing abstinence in youth. There are many causes to be discovered and eliminated so that pledges and bribes are only adjuncts after all. We are drifting in the right direction anyhow. Edward Eggleston says: "It was estimated early in the eighteenth century that about one building in every ten in Philadelphia was used in some way for the sale of rum," and in Massachusetts Governor Belcher was afraid that the colony would "be delighted with spirituous liquors." The outlook is not so bad that we need worry. We cannot permit nature to evoke national sobriety by her old trick of killing off all the drunkards, the method explained by Dr. G. A. Reid in his book on alcoholism. It is too expensive in valuable lives—prevention is the new method in this day and generation.—Dr. Charles L. Dana in American Medicine.

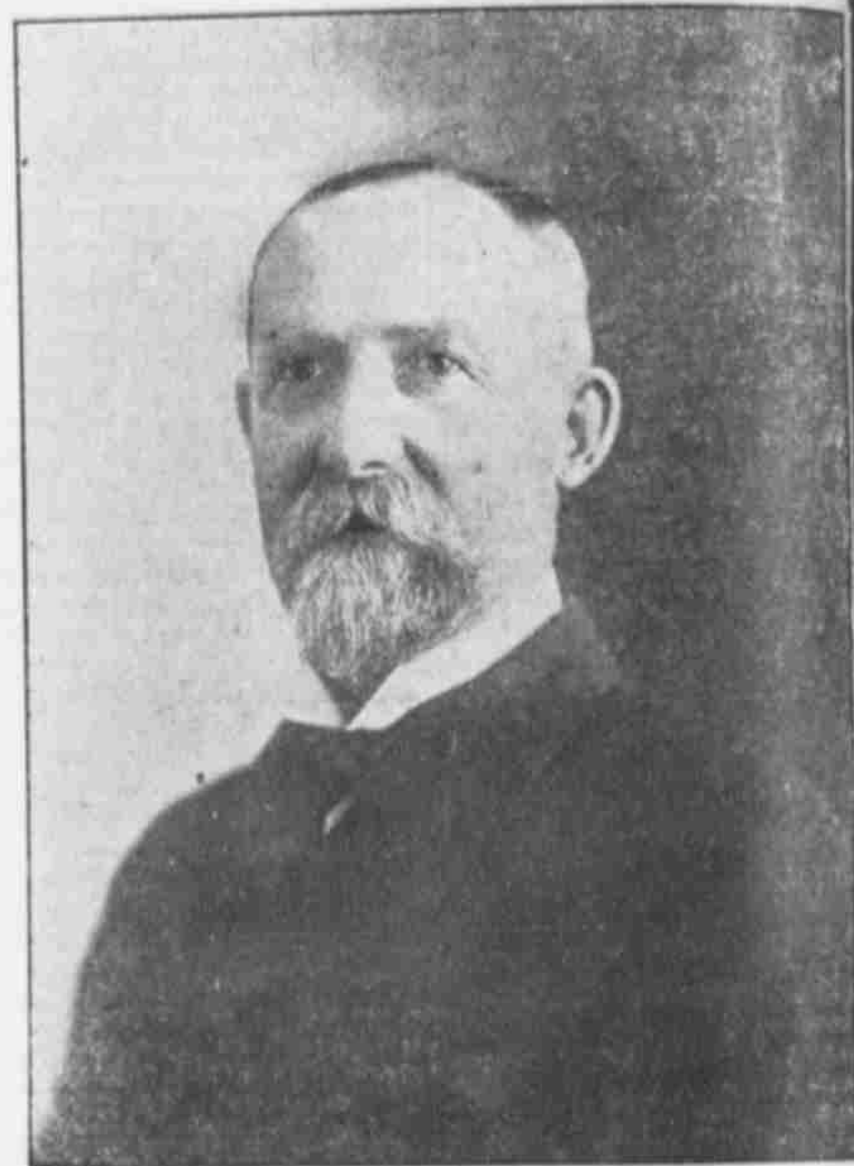

WINNING MEN WHO ARE GAINING

Other State Officials and Candidates for Senator Who Are Running Well

Hon. Ed. T. Judd has recently returned from Southern Oregon, and says that region, outside of an element in the towns and cities, that is for John James Withycombe for governor, as far as the Republicans are concerned.

For the Debate.

The students of the University are planning to run a special excursion to Albany March 9th, in order to attend the state oratorical college contest which will be there. It is the intention to get 75 excursionists, in order that low rates may be secured. The return trip will be made after the close of the contest. Many have already signified their intention of going, and some of these are not students. Considerable enthusiasm is manifested over the contest and Williamette's orator, Mr. Parcel will be cheered on to victory by a band of enthusiastic rooters. The oratorical contest is the greatest of all college gatherings, and the various institutions in the state association vie with each other in turning out large delegations.

Is a Legal Holiday.

In reply to an inquiry from the county school superintendent of Walla Walla county, asking an opinion as to whether the direct primary nominating election day is a legal holiday, "I beg to inform you that, in my opinion," says Attorney General Crawford, "it is a legal holiday."

After having quoted section 3918 of Bellinger and Cotton's code, he says: "Thus it is plain that if the direct primary nominating election is an election, with in the meaning of that section, then it is a holiday."

The judges and clerks of election, appointed under the general law, preside at and hold the primary election, and count and certify the vote, and returns are made in the same manner and by the same officers appointed under the general law for other elections.

Land Officers Named.

Washington, March 1.—The President today nominated Andrew J. Gillis register of the land office at Walla Walla, Wash., and Jesse G. Miller, of Dayton, Wash., receiver of public moneys at Walla Walla.
