

BOURNE GIVES VIEWS

Famous Portland Mining Man Candidate for Senator

Johnathan Bourne has filed with the secretary of state his formal declaration of intention to be a candidate for United States senator at the Republican primaries. In his platform Mr. Bourne declares that if nominated and elected he will favor:

"Republican policies."
"Amending national constitution for people's election of United States senators."

"Publicity political campaign expenses."

"National control of corporation in interstate commerce."

"Right exclusion of Asiatic coolie labor; good wages make good citizens."

"Legal limitation labor hours for safety on railroads."

"Parcel post, including rural delivery."

"Pure food laws."

"Liberal appropriations for Panama canal, coast defense, river and harbor improvements, including Columbia, Willamette rivers, Coos, Yaquina and other Oregon harbors, Colho canal, government canal at Oregon City."

"Fair share of irrigation fund for Oregon."

"Loyal support of successful castilities."

"High enforcement Statement No. 1."

"Roosevelt for second elective term."

Mr. Bourne has requested the secretary of state to place on the ballot after his name the following declaration:

"I will support President Roosevelt's determination that justice be done all men."

One of the interesting features of Mr. Bourne's platform is his advocacy of the election of President Roosevelt for another term. He is also an advocate of the election of United States senators by popular vote, and he favors the rigid enforcement of statement No. 1 of the direct primary law. He is a candidate for the full term of six years, beginning March 4, 1907, and not for the short term of seven or eight weeks which will elapse between the meeting of the next legislature and March 4.

Mr. Bourne is a New Englander by nativity, having been born in New Bedford, Massachusetts, February 23, 1835. He was a Republican member of the legislature in 1885 and in the special session of 1886. He was one of Oregon's delegates to the Republican national convention in 1888, and a member of the Republican national committee for the four years following. He was again a delegate to the national convention of 1892, and in 1893 he was once more elected to the state legislature, running as a Mitchell Republican.

Mr. Bourne has been prominently identified with the development of the mineral resources of Oregon and is said to have expended more than \$1,000,000 of his own money in the acquisition and development of mines in the state.

BROWNELL OPENS FIRE

State Senator George O. Brownell, the legislator and political leader of Clackamas county, as he is termed, opened his campaign, with the assistance of the Milwaukee bank, for his re-election as state senator from Clackamas county at a rousing meeting held at the town hall in Milwaukee. Mr. Brownell said:

"All that I want is fair and honest treatment." He attacked his opponent, Mr. Porter, and O. W. Eastham, vigorously claiming that for 12 years they had been conspiring against him.

"For 12 years I have been senator. Did those men ever give me credit for one single thing? In 1903 I was given a vote of thanks by every one of the senators, including six Democrats, who represented the opposition. I know that I have made mistakes; every man makes them. I stand upon my record. I will give \$100 tonight if a man can quote me one instance where either Porter or Eastham ever did one thing for the interest of the people without being paid for it. And if you think Porter is a better citizen, vote for him. I am not here to ask for your sympathy, your love or your affection; all I want is fair play. My record is in the senate journal. I challenge either Porter or Eastham to state one vote that I have ever cast against the interests of the taxpayers of this county. If they can I will withdraw my nomination for state senator; or if I have ever favored a railroad corporation which was against the interests of the people, I will withdraw from this nomination."

"I voted in behalf of the fellow servant law. If I was in sympathy with the railroad I would have voted against it. I supported and induced the orphan home bill."

"In 1898 I was the person who exposed the school frauds in this state, the shortage being \$35,000. In 1903 when the wealthy lumber companies of the state tried to confiscate the water power of the state, I was instrumental in defeating it."

"During the session of 1901 I moved the adoption of the initiative and referendum, and if it had not been for my influence it would not have been put on the statute books of the state of Oregon."

"I voted for the law to put vestibules on cars. I voted against the present law for shavings. I voted against the imposing of a tax on hunters. I voted against the bill for support of normal schools in the state. The only law that I have ever fallen down on was the eight hour law, which I voted for."

Senator Brownell discussed his indictment, showing by the Senate Journal that he was at the time he was accused of perjury at Salem the day before, on the day and the day after. After speaking two hours to an interested audience Mr. Brownell introduced a few other candidates on the ticket.

WRIGHTMAN IN LANE COUNTY

P. T. Wrightman, who was in Eugene yesterday and last night, paying the local lodge of Knights of Pythias order a visit, is a candidate for the office of secretary of state and is out canvassing the state for the nomination. Mr. Wrightman is the grand tribune of the lodge and has many friends here in Eugene. He states that he likes his chances for the nomination in April and has already been over a great part of the state furthering his campaign. He has been in eastern Oregon, where that section is particularly friendly to him.

At present Mr. Wrightman is conducting the affairs of the corporation department in the secretary of state's office. He is a prominent attorney of Salem and has been in his present office three years. He states that the office that he conducts took from the corporations of the state during the year 1905 \$120,000, which is one-sixth of the amount that is required to run the state.

"Yes, I think that I shall receive the nomination," said Mr. Wrightman yesterday, "and although I have two competitors from Marion county, Claud Gatch and Lot Pierce, I think that I am stronger there than either of those two gentlemen. I have recently been in eastern Oregon and I have every reason to believe that that section is very strong for me. Nearly all the valley counties that I have been in are strong for my interests, as I have a very wide acquaintance throughout the state."

"Tomorrow I go to Grants Pass. Another candidate for the office is P. W. Benson of Roseburg. Mr. Benson is well known in that section but I shall get a good many votes from Douglas county."

Mr. Wrightman is very well known here in Lane county and he was a staunch supporter of L. T. Harris in the convention two years ago, when Mr. Harris had aspirations for congressional honors. He was one of the 39 delegates from Marion county who stood by Judge Harris.

Special Train Seems Assured.

The University students are making progress in the securing of a special train for the Willamette delegation to attend the state oratorical contest, at Albany. The train will leave here about 6:30, and return at the close of the contest. It is reported that the number of excursionists necessary to obtain the one-fare rate has been practically obtained. Townpeople, as well as students, can avail themselves of the low rates offered.

SOAKED WITH CLIMATE

The Journal Man Writes of Sunshine Landscape and More Sunshine

Just what the exact meaning of Pasadena may be, is not known, but it is something like paradise, and that's near enough to suit the resident and tourist alike. The former claim it is the most beautiful little city in the world, and they make good to such an extent that all the latter fully believe it, and come here to spend their shekels. In the past five years Pasadena has doubled in population, from 10,000 to 20,000. This is not the result of accident, nor has the Creator done all that was necessary to bring it about. The most He did was to produce the sunshine and the desert waste upon which much of it is built. Koen-sighted business men, with a proper appreciation of the beautiful, did the rest. Pasadena can no longer be called simply a city of homes, for it not only has these, but it is also a good business point. It has some factories and good shipping facilities for the products of the soil. Oranges, apricots, peaches and small fruits predominate.

The other day it was our privilege to go up through San Fernando valley as far as Ventura, making the trip by electric and steam cars, auto, afoot and by horse. This trip took us through the country made famous by Helen Hunt in *Romana*. We saw the old sheep-shearing corral at the Camulos ranch, where Alessandro performed his wonderful feats of sheep-barbering and conquests of love. It was from this point that the author makes her hero start on his long tramp for life and love. The residents in these parts point out with a species of grandstand pride the different points of interest in the story, but when they pour out their innermost feelings the story loses a little of its glamour. One old-timer, who knows something about native Mexicans, Indians and Spaniards, stated that, as a tale of romance *Romana* was no doubt a work of art, but feared that she had woven her story about the wrong kind of a specimen, for, he said, without fear of contradiction, that no sheep-shearing Greaser ever lived who had a spark of sentiment or romance in his make-up. But California knows how to coin all these works of the imagination into filthy here, and cheerfully accepts the tale of *Romana* in its entirety—for what it is worth.

San Fernando valley was, of course, a mission in the early days, and the old ruins of their headquarters are still in evidence. Some years ago a thrifty company of Yankees bought the old Spanish grant from the remaining priests, including their herds and flocks. They paid the price, took the deed, they then began to round up the cattle on a thousand hills and sold more than enough to pay for the whole purchase. It is a series of rich grazing valleys, and one can readily see how stock would have multiplied indefinitely until the above story could easily be true.

Through this valley is now being brought vast lines of electric fluid, generated by the waters of the Kerr river, 150 miles over the Tehachapi mountains. It is now also proposed to cut a tunnel through the mountains, and in a similar manner pipe the waters of the Owens river down into this dry valley, and as far as Los Angeles. After passing over a large waste of granite boulders and cactus this valley widens out into the most fertile agricultural country.

At Satiny we made our first stop, and there found Ernest Bean, son of Oregon's senior justice of the supreme court. He is here spending a year on the large ranch of his father's uncle, Hon. J. M. Sharp. Ernest looks brown as nut, has gained 15 pounds and is enjoying excellent health in this exhilarating climate. Mr. Sharp has a large ranch, with a modern home, and a very interesting family of boys and girls. Here they have the best educational facilities, live at the foot of the mountain range, in a fertile valley within an hour's drive of the broad beaches of the Pacific. Mr. Sharp grows mostly English walnuts, and has an orchard of more than 100 acres, besides all kinds of fruit, and does general farming. He has recently joined a number of his neighbors in a banking enterprise at Santa Paula, a good town of 1500, where they have a rare opening for such an enterprise. Mr. Sharp is an old-time Oregonian, and is watching with great interest the experiments with English walnuts in the Willamette valley. He thinks we can grow the trees and auto all right, but fears there will be some when it will be trouble-

some to harvest the nuts on account of the early rains. In this section flowing artesian wells have been struck, and they are being used to irrigate the walnut and other crops. Ventura county has long been known as a bean county, and here it is that Linas and little navy grow to perfection. The fogs from the ocean are a strong element in the success of the crop, and they are also helpful to the walnut crop. Oxnard, where the best sugar factory on the coast is located, is only a few miles from here, and this vast industry is helping to enrich the ranchers. Scores of farms in this section are occupied by tenants, and thus while the great manufacturing enterprise is enriching the owners, it is making it a much less desirable place of residence. The small beet crop down here are much of the hop crop in Oregon. They are wealth for the land owners, but are great upbuilders of society.

We drove four miles against a strong headwind to visit an old-time friend, who lives against the foot of the mountain. Here he is spending the ripe years of his old age, and enjoying all the luxuries of this rare climate, and looking upon a panorama extending to the sea, such as must be a constant inspiration and a joy of dwelling here.
