A WOMAN WITH TALENT

The Pittsburg (Pennsylvania) Dispatch has been publishing a series of articles entitled "Women Who Have Arrived." In its issue of January 14th it contains a lengthy sketch of Miss Gail Laughlin, a part of which is as follows:

One of the most interesting and many-sided women yet brought to my notice as one who has "arrived" is Miss Gail Laughlin, the subject of this sketch. Since finding her and deciding to write about her, my plans have changed several times, owing to indisposition in regard to where to place her. She has done so many things and done them equally well. She is always found in the front ranks of her latest undertaking. This being "to the fore" dates back to her school days, when she finished at an early age, and carried off first honors in everything.

I first looked her up as the one and only woman ever appointed expert agent of the United States Industrial Commission to investigate conditions of domestic service in America. I found out that in this capacity she put in four months of the hardest kind of work on the investigation, and that her report is an accepted authority on domestic service, being the only report of the kind ever put out by our government.

After this I heard of her as the woman who had so successfully answered Ex-President Cleveland on the woman suffrage question; and that she is an orator of the most talented type—a lawyer, practicing in New York with great success—but that her fail or hobby or greatest heart-interest is in equal suffrage, of which movement she is the national organizer.

Indeed it was easier to hear of what Miss Laughlin is doing than to hear of any other woman before the public to-day, for she has been so many things, all of consequence, and doing them after an original fashion that attracted attention wherever she went.

So much for the achievements of this gifted young woman. Her friends tell me that those whose privilege it is to become acquainted with her private life say that words fall short of depicting the irresistible charm of her personality, and the wonderful power of soul which on intuitively feels in her presence. Her reserve force seems inexhaustible. She never reaches her limit; she possesses a sense of honor so keen that her friends are wont to test themselves by it; and great as her intellect is, there is a fine force of character about her which is still greater, and which make it an inspiration to come in touch with a soul so lofty.
