

POLITICAL POTPOURRI CONSOMME

Review of the Situation in This Congressional District

E. H. Flagg is a Candidate for the Legislature-Observations on the Primary Law

Woodburn Special to Sunday Oregonian: Walter L. Toose, candidate for congress in this district, has returned home from a visit in Southern Oregon, where he received many assurances of support. He is strongly in the lead in Southern Oregon, while the coast counties are overwhelmingly for him. I. H. Bingham, of Lane county, who was the most prominent congressional candidate in the south, has withdrawn from the race, and is a candidate for state senator.

The Hawley forces in this county show plain evidence of disintegration. Mark Skiff, Marshall Tom Cornelius and several others of Salem who were included in the Hawley list, are supporting Toose; while Thomas Kay and others quoted as "united on Hawley," declare such a statement as unauthorized. The straw vote taken at Albany and favoring Toose was doubtless taken among his friends by an avowed

Huston man. Friends of Toose assert that he is leading both Huston and Hawley in Linn county by long odds.

The report that Toose's own precinct would not support him is like the other reports. He carried Woodburn at the last election by a vote of 200 to 59 and this year the people of Woodburn will stand by their candidate by a larger majority, while Marion county will doubtless roll up a good plurality for him on April 20.

Voters all over the district are turning to the support of Toose because he is fought by the Salem school land ring and those who have profited by questionable methods in the procurement of our public lands. A strong point being generally advocated by the electors of the district in favor of Toose's nomination for congress is his record and services for 20 years in the enunciation of the principles of sound Republicanism, in marked contrast to the well known and admitted fact that neither Huston or Hawley has ever been actively identified with the Republican party until they became candidates for congress.

Analysis of W. Lair Thompson's Article.

W. Lair Thompson, of Albany, the correspondent of the Oregonian, who is a supporter of S. B. Huston, has a review of the situation in the first congressional district that is very favorable to W. L. Toose, of Woodburn, although seeking to convey the impression that Mr. Huston is about running even with the other candidates. He estimates that Lane, Jackson, Douglas and Josephine will cast one-third of the Republican vote of the district and will have the decision of the matter as between Toose, Hawley and Huston. That is a concession to Toose, who is known to be very strong in those counties. He admits: "The man who can get the bulk of the vote in those counties, added to anything like a respectable following in the Willamette valley, stands a bright chance of winning the primary fight." He adds: "Could any one candidate sweep the counties mentioned and secure the strong following of Binger Hermann he could land the plum."

Mr. Thompson then argues that if the three candidates divide the Southern Oregon counties evenly, the vote in the Willamette valley will determine the result. But Mr. Thompson falls into error by saying that Huston and Toose will divide Clackamas county. Indications are that the three candidates will stand about as follows: Toose, Hawley and Huston, with Toose polling as many as the other two put together.

Mr. Thompson in the Oregonian could not rest content without putting Toose out of the race, which he does in the following magnificent manner:

"From most of the valley counties in the district estimates have been re-

ceived from three well known men. An average of these estimates, which are based upon the total Republican vote given above, places the candidates excitingly near each other in regard to strength, with Huston and Hawley running neck and neck for first place."

All the above is done to give his favorite standing in the eyes of the people, which is very laudable if that is what a great newspaper is to be used for. For it is a certain fact that beyond the life that the Tongue faction at Hillsboro can inject into Mr. Huston's campaign, he has absolutely no following among Republicans. His frantic warfare on the Southern Pacific should not deceive the people, for it is not recalled that the Tongue regime meant death to all west coast harbor improvements, and the millions that were formerly secured for Oregon harbors like Coos Bay and Yaquina Bay were under Tongue's administration switched to San Pedro, Cal. That Huston is a west coast harbor champion will not be received with great enthusiasm, when he is the candidate of the Tongue machine. Mr. Thompson concludes that the campaign is the most strenuous that has ever been waged in Oregon for a congressional nomination. Mr. Toose has let no grass grow under his feet, and has set the pace that all the rest have followed, copying his platform and adopting his methods of using literature.

Mr. Toose will put in the rest of the time until the 28th of April campaigning before the people in the various counties. He will visit the smaller places and hold meetings in them, having the whole day to visit citizens and then talking Republicanism in the evening. He will hire his own halls, preferring to spend his money in legitimate expenses and making direct appeals to the voters, to doing his political business through bosses and with managers.

The fact remains that Walter L. Toose is the only candidate before the people who has much of a political record as a worker for Republican principles, or has any record for extended services for the party. Mr. Huston has recently come into the party, and like Mr. Hawley, has no basis for asking high office. All the campaigning that either of them has done would hardly entitle them to become a candidate for county office, and it is doubtful if either of them was ever a delegate to a county, district or state convention. If they were it would behoove their managers to make public the times, dates and places when they acted in such public manner with the party whose highest honors they seek.
