MADE STRONG PLEA

Miss Gail Laughlin Talks Eloquent About Equal Suffrage

The auditorium of the Methodist church was taxed to its full capacity Tuesday evening to listen to Miss Gail Laughlin speak on equal suffrage. The speaker is one of those imported for the Oregon campaign and stands alone among women as an effective campaign orator. She has a rich, strong voice, and strikes her arguments home with virile force. Her speech last evening was a treat.

Miss Laughlin was introduced by Hon. Jefferson Myers, who, though a hop grower, stated he did not fear the votes of the Oregon women, because the men's interests and those of the women were identical in many respects. "I shall vote for the amendment to the state constitution without fear of legislation confiscating any property rights now enjoyed by our people."

The speaker based her arguments on the Declaration of Independence that "governments derived their just powers from the consent of the governed" and that "taxation without representation is tyranny." "An aristocracy is a government in which a part of the people rule all the people. Is this not the kind of government we have in America today?" asked Miss Laughlin.

The speaker asserted that every step which the world had taken toward political liberty was to make governments more representative. Historically, government by one man, despotism, government by the few and finally government by the many, have been the steps forward. But there is still the aristocracy of sex. "The only political companions women have among men are idiots," exclaimed Miss Laughlin, and most women seem to like that company," she added, amid an outburst of applause and laughter.

She said that she had been informed that 3000 Indians exercised the right to vote in this state. Why should Indians who harnessed and killed the early settlers of the Oregon country be granted a franchise, which is not given to the native daughters of the pioneer mothers, that settled Oregon? If women must obey the laws they should have a voice in the making of them. Men and women are different; a son cannot represent a mother any more than he can represent a father. Equal suffrage means that we will have a government of men and women for and by men and women.

Why should not women enter politics when politics greet her in her everyday life; yes, in her very kitchen and home. "Politics is something that touches the life of each and every one of us." Fifteen per cent of the food consumed in this country is adulterated and the woman who prepares the food ought to have the right to make the laws that govern our food supply. That is politics, and it is a reasonable thing for women to be concerned about.

While the conditions in the equal suffrage states of Wyoming, Colorado, Utah and Idaho are not ideal, yet the ballot box in the hands of women has not been a menace to those states. It has rather been a benefit, it has proved to be both just and expedient. Miss Laughlin was optimistic as to the result of the outcome of the vote next June on the equal suffrage amendment.

The speaker was frequently applauded, and she certainly merited it.

A Dangerous Place of Refuge.
