Ribbons Everywhere; in Baskets, Hat Trimmings, Shirred and Frilled on Gowns and Parasols, Spring Suits, Materials, Lingerie Waists, Ponies and Empire Coats.

Ribbon trimmings are seen on all sides. Hats are wreathed with ribbon loops, dresses of sheer materials have garniture in fancy braiding patterns of shirred ribbon, and ribbon edges the overlapping scant flounces, or heads the bias folds that are used tuck fashion on circular skirts. Baskets adorn gowns of all sorts, except tailor gowns, and

fashion favors. Wide brocaded satin ribbons were further enriched by designs wrought in gold or silver plain, brocaded or in striped effects, and heavier metal galloons for beltings and for hat bands, while among the products of American manufacture there were less expensive but were in very pretty styles in moss roses and buds, poinsettias and violets.

"Tulip" Messalines.

"Tulip" messalines, a plain soft satin ribbon that rivals the tulip in the beauty and variety of its colorings and failleines just imported in soft ribbed weave and chiffon texture, both plain and with hemstitched borders are especially designed for hat trimmings. Spring Suits.

Two styles vie with one another for leadership in spring suits. The prin-

Either style is fashionable, but the princess requires most skill to make satisfactorily and is atrocious when not perfectly fitted.

Lingerie Waists.

Lingerie waists are still first choice, but they must be made of really nice material and put together daintily, or they too are atrocious. Silk waists are worn of course and the more dressey ones are made in lingerie styles with buckles, lace insertions and embroidery. Plain silk waists are nice, especially for school girls, and checks make a desirable waist for utility wear. Silk waists are usually chosen to match the color of the suit, or in a shade that blends rather than contrasts.

Headwear.

Hats are small comparatively and soft straws are liked that lend themselves to being shaped and draped as readily as velvet. Crowns are often round and low in many of the newest shapes and the brim that droops all round is much in evidence. This shape is almost always trimmed with a wreath like arrangement of ribbon loops, ribbon about four inches wide of soft texture. Long sweeping, cigarette like plumes or similarly shaped plumes of paradise or coque are a feature of the most modish hats. Black hats of "erin" or horsehair braid, and of lace with satin crowns and hats of silky rose colored straw with matching trimmings are much worn. Sailor shapes are used for dress hats, the crowns rather high, and the brims very narrow. The favorite trimming is a full ruche surrounding the crown of quilled ribbon, tulle or lace edged muslin with a band of very small varicolored flowers in light tints through the center and a full bow of velvet or silk ribbon surrounds the bandouliere at the back of the hat, and fills in the space becomingly.
