SENATORSSix Anxious to do the
Upper HouseAnother Statement No. 1 Senator
Said to be in the
Shadowy Gloaming

There are now six candidates in the field for the two Marion county senatorships, and it is reported that a dark horse is still to come out of the woods and make the race as a statement No. 1 candidate, and running mate for Hon. E. M. Croston, who, so far, is the only aspirant to sign the pledge among those running for the senate. Who his running mate will be no one knows, but all may rest assured that Jonathan Bourne, the champion of statement No. 1, will have a Richmond in the field.

The List of Nobles.

Among the candidates for the state senate in Marion county, Hon. Alex. LaFollette bears the distinction of being a cousin of Governor and United States Senator LaFollette, of Wisconsin. He is the big farmer of the bunch, having one of the largest and model farms of the county, and has taken more prizes at the state fair than any other one man. He has not yet filed any statement of his candidacy.

Hon. J. N. Smith, of this city, makes no pledges on the senatorship. He has enjoyed a large medical practice, and takes broad and liberal views on all matters. His name is almost a household word in Marion county, there being about a dozen Smiths in the medical practice, and hundreds of Smiths the county over, who will all probably support "Little Doc."

Hon. Tom Kay has filed his declaration, agreeing to serve the people to the best of his ability, and as the senatorship he does not sign statement No. 1, but says: "I intend to support the people's choice for United States senator." Those who know Tom know that he means just what he says. He is the big manufacturer of the aggregation.

Hon. W. H. Hobson, of Stayton, is the general merchant of the senatorial precinct. He qualifies statement No. 1, to confine his vote to the Republican having the largest number of votes for senator. That will be the Republican nominee, and by this he means that should the Democrat win out at the popular election he would go on voting for the Republican candidate. Mr. Hobson has served two terms in the senate, and is the only candidate from up in the Bentonian country.

Hon. E. M. Croston takes statement No. 1, signing it unqualifiedly, and standing for that principle. He has served two terms in the senate, and relies on his record to get him votes. He is a farmer and capitalist, and champion of the monument down at Champoug.

Hon. John S. Richie, of Scotts Mills, has served a term in the lower house, and cannot see why he should not be promoted to the higher branch of the

legislature. He has many friends among the ladies, and if they had a vote would be sure of the nomination. He has served a term in the legislature of Dakota, and was not convicted of anything.

A Conditional Pardon.

Governor Chamberlain issued yesterday a conditional commutation of sentence in favor of Charles Houghton, of Multnomah county, who is serving a five-year sentence for robbery. The reasons for the executive's order: A petition from a large number of citizens, good conduct as a prisoner, recommendation for conditional commutation by Hon. A. L. Frazer, who gave the sentence; the peculiar condition of his parents, the father being totally blind and the mother an invalid, both of whom are entirely dependent upon kindness of friends, and the promises Houghton makes to support them in the future.

Watson for Senator.

E. B. Watson, of Portland, has filed his notice of candidacy for Republican nomination for United States senator, for the term beginning March 4, 1907. He says: "I will during my term of office devote my entire time and attention to the performance of its duties, support general policies and all measures designed to effect the general objects of the administration of President Roosevelt, and exert myself to the utmost to secure such legislation in congress as will meet the just demands of the people of the state of Oregon." He wishes printed after his name: "Popular rights cannot be surrendered for the advancement of private interests."

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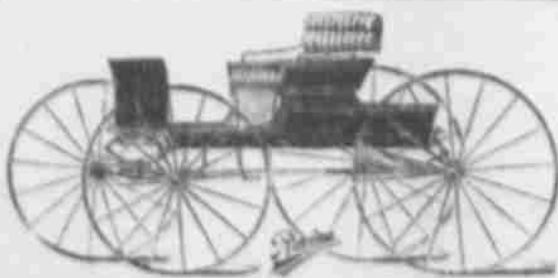
