Registration books for primary election close April 10.
Primary election April 20.
Registration books again opened April 25 and close May 15.
Last day for filing names for state and district offices March 30.
Last day for filing names for county offices April 4.
Caucusing votes for nominating state and district candidates May 5.
Last day for filing nominating petitions for county offices May 19.
Last day for filing certificates of nomination May 5.
General election June 4.

PUBLISH LAND BOARD PROCEEDINGS.

One law that should be passed by the next legislature should be to require publicity of the transactions of the state land board.

Valuable farms and property and large transactions were disposed of THAT THE PUBLIC ARE ENTITLED TO KNOW ABOUT.

A valuable ranch was sold in Coos county the past week for \$1049, and there was little or no advertisement of the same.

Like the grafts that were stopped by publishing the county court proceedings, publicity of the land board would stop many steals.

The transactions of the state land board are a closed book to the public, and frauds could be stopped by complete publicity in the newspapers.

This is one of the greatest and most needed reforms required in the state government.

Arched Roof Train Sheds.

American railway officials have learned by experience what the general public does not know, that the huge arch roofed train sheds, of which many notable examples were built in this country a dozen years ago, are bound to be short lived on account of the rapid corrosion of the iron and steel by locomotive gases. They give trouble by leakage from start to finish, and only constant vigilance saves the passengers using them from frequent casualties due to falling glass. As they grow older, and their weakening by corrosion proceeds farther, they become more and more of a menace, and their ultimate removal in a time far shorter than those who erected them ever dreamed is now tolerably certain.

In the light of present knowledge, the best arrangement of the tracks at a railway terminus appears to be either umbrella platforms between the tracks, or, if a train shed of some sort is demanded, then build a structure with moderate span roofs of reinforced concrete and with no metal exposed to corrosion.

As for the frequent objection that the umbrella roofed platform gives inadequate protection to passengers in bad weather, it is not apparent why the passenger can fairly demand any different protection at a railway terminal than is given him at hotel stations. A roofed over walk from the car to the waiting room really answers all reasonable requirements.

In relation to the recent collapse of the Claring Cross roof the writer goes on to say:

"We understand that the accident has set British railway managers and engineers at work on a general overhauling and examination of the condition of all the large train shed roofs, and we shall be surprised if the results of the examination are by any means reassuring. It may as well be con-

fessed that the extent to which corrosion has reduced the strength of a great complicated steel structure like a train shed roof is not a matter which can be computed or estimated with mathematical accuracy.

"While American railway engineers have hitherto been chiefly concerned regarding the maintenance of the skylights, the wire netting guards and similar minor details in the train sheds here, the time is not far distant when the effect of corrosion on some of the main members may need careful consideration. It is true that most large American train shed roofs are of recent construction compared with those of England; but on the other hand most of them are built of steel instead of iron, and it is likely that some, at least have been under worse conditions of attack by smoke and acid gases than the English train sheds."—Engineering News.

The Socialist Convention.

Ed. Journal: Will you please give me space to give a correct report of the state convention of the Socialist party of Oregon, as the reports in the Portland papers have been so conflicting, and some of them badly garbled.

The convention was called to order at 11 a. m. Sunday by State Chairman R. P. Ramp. A temporary organization was formed with Comrade Hamish, of Albany, as chairman, and R. C. Brown, of Roseburg, secretary. A committee was elected on credentials, and recess was taken until they reported. Then the temporary organization was made permanent. Committees on order of business, also on platform and resolutions were elected, and adjournment was taken at 1:30 p. m.

The meeting was called to order, and the committee on order of business reported, and the report was adopted.

The committee on platform reported, and its report was adopted by sections, as read. The committee on resolutions reported resolutions as follows: One denouncing the actions of the Idaho and Colorado authorities for the manner in which the arrests of the officers of the federation were made, and the treatment accorded them, and denouncing such procedure. Another one favoring woman suffrage, and the one given by the Telegram of the 14th, inst., by myself as the author, was a fire brand thrown in to arouse the manhood of the party members, showing them that the election of Geo. Chamberlain as the last election was done by the so-called Socialists casting their vote for him, instead of for their own candidate, and the convention unanimously denounced any socialist who would betray his principles of reform to elect any old party candidate. And at the coming election so Socialist will be found casting a ballot to reinstate the old Democratic party, that has never been known for any great reform measures. We, as Socialists, most emphatically denounce any fusion for the spoils of office. We are as much opposed to graft by Democrats as by Republicans. We stand for reform in every branch, public ownership of public utilities, the election of all candidates by the people and removal from office at any time when proved unworthy of the same. Equal rights to all, special privileges to none. Justice to all classes, rich and poor alike. I am yours respectfully.

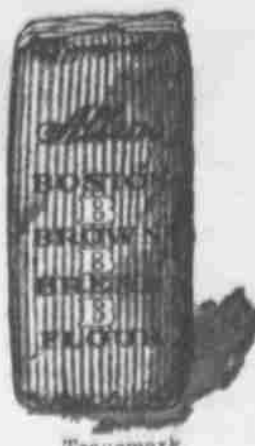
