NEW YORK BREAD LINE

Some months ago editorial reference was made to the famous "bread line" that forms every night at the Fleischmann Vienna Bakery in New York city, in which it was shown that but very few of the thousands of shivering applicants for charity were really deserving of the bounty bestowed upon them. And now comes the Charity Organization society with even further proof of the correctness of this view which seems to be unquestionably correct. In a recent report on the subject issued by the society, it is said that during the last year persistent efforts were put forth by the joint application bureau to reach men of the "bread line." In the months of March and April 25,000 tickets were distributed to them, promising prompt aid and at least temporary work in the wood yard to all who would call. Of the total number only 305 came. Of these 94 per cent were single, 14 per cent were widowers, 6 per cent were married, and 6 per cent were deserting husbands. Sixty-seven per cent were under 40 and 6 per cent under 20 years of age. Of the 188 men who were sent to the wood yard, 127 arrived there. The failure on the part of so many to use the bureau, and the fact that sixty-one men out of 188 who were directed to the wood yard did not feel the need of earning food and lodging but could get it more easily in another way would go to show that the men of the "bread line" are in no great need or that the application bureau has not yet been able to reach them.

Accepting these figures as true, it seems that it is indeed necessary to feed the proverbial thousand underserving in order that the one deserving may secure food. Nevertheless, any one who has ever watched this historical bread line form, particularly on a bitter winter night, will have considerable difficulty in believing that the line is made up almost wholly of professional and unworthy beggars. As is generally known, this bakery distributes at midnight, year in and year out, generous portions of bread to every one that applies for it, without regard for "race, creed or color." No questions are asked, the only conditions being that the applicants form in an orderly line and wait their respective turns. When the weather is cold this really means that the "beggars" has got to work not a little before his turn comes. Frequently the line extends for blocks, and in order to be sure of a portion the line begins to form frequently hours in advance of the distribution. The sympathetic onlooker, therefore, who sees scantily clothed and extremely hungry looking men standing in a line for hours in intensely cold weather or refuses to believe that they are not worthy of the charity bestowed upon them, or in any event one's sense of justice insists that they earn the little they receive. All of which goes to prove that after all sentiment is a poor guide for the practical philanthropist, and also explains in some measure why organized charity often fails in its expressed purposes, being concerned most in not helping the unworthy than in giving aid to the real deserving.

As soon as the charity has been "organized" it at once proceeds to figure and tabulate and gather and compile array of statistics for "reports," and in the meanwhile the hungry and the needy nurse their poverty and misfortune unaided rather than go through the searching inquisition and investigation imperatively insisted upon before an "organization" will grant relief. Affliction shrinks from publicity and is peculiarly sensitive to the humiliation of confessing a weakness, and it is to avoid this that the average beggar prefers to ask for alms in the street or accept the crust of bread given without question, so that having asked and received he can disappear in the shadows which the limelight of charity throws.—*Poor Trade News.*
