

CITY COUNCIL BUSY

Nickle in the Slot Machine Ordinance Was Not Repealed--Other Important Matters

The city council met Tuesday evening in regular session, and every member was present, except Steusloff, who is in Alberta, Canada.

The report of the committee on ordinances was made to the effect that the committee could not come to any conclusion relative to the nickel-in-the-slot machine ordinance. The ordinance relative to the duties of the city treasurer was returned with a series of amendments. The matter over which a discussion ensued was a provision made for an appropriation to pay \$100 for the treasurer's bonds in a surety company. After some discussion pro and con, a motion was made to refer the matter to a committee, but it was defeated by a vote of six to seven. According to this new ordinance the bond is raised to \$30,000, instead of \$5000.

A petition from some of the residents of the eastern part of the city was presented, asking that a special policeman be appointed. That part of the city has been the rendezvous of tramps and many boys. The petition asked that J. B. Hom be appointed, but the matter was referred to the committee on health and police.

Another petition, calling for a new sidewalk in front of block 37 was referred to the committee on streets.

On motion the balance in favor of both the park board and the library board was authorized drawn for each of the respective boards.

The committee on fire and water was ordered to investigate and ascertain

the cost of putting in a fire alarm system.

Poundmaster Malvin, of the sixth ward, handed in his resignation, and the same was accepted.

Councilman Bayne made a motion that the recorder be instructed to make a report of the number and kinds of licensed slot-machines used in the city, also the amount of revenue derived therefrom, and the name of the licensee. Carried.

Mr. Bayne made another resolution, which was adopted, to the effect that the new street signs be given another coat of paint on the back and edges, provided the price was not to exceed 1½ cent additional per sign.

Councilman Gesser moved that a fill be made at the south end of Commercial street. The street commissioner was instructed to dump proper garbage and to make a fill at that place.

The matter of draining the locality near Miller and Kearney streets, in South Salem was discussed and sewer pipes were ordered laid across Commercial at Miller and Kearney, while street improvements are being made.

An ordinance for the prohibiting of dogs from running at large, and providing for the duties of the marshal, was referred to ordinance committee.

The ordinance concerning the city treasurer and his duties was referred back for slight changes.

The ordinance relating to the licensing of fortune tellers, physiognomists, clairvoyants, etc., and fixing the license at \$40 per year was passed unanimously.

The ordinance defining the duties of the city recorder was passed by a unanimous vote. Some of the provisions of this ordinance are that the recorder file a monthly report of the finances; that he draw no warrants except on the order of the council; also that he prepare a monthly payroll of the city employees by the 5th of each month.

Mr. Bayne made a motion that consideration of the slot machine ordinance be postponed until next meeting, and he made a special order of business at that time.

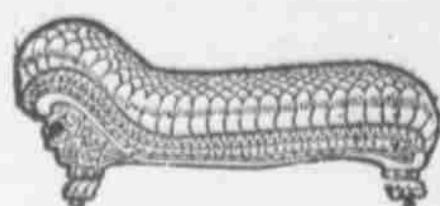
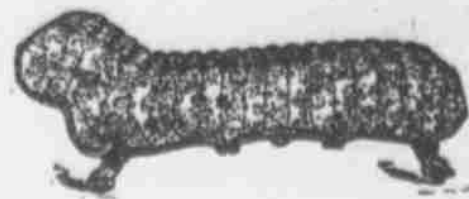
A message from the mayor vetoing ordinance No. 478 was then read. This ordinance prescribed the duties of the fire chief and gave him the duties of a policeman. It is the latter feature which proved displeasing to the mayor. He stated it was poor policy to wean part of the duties of one city department with those of another. Councilman Bayne moved that further consideration of this ordinance be indefinitely postponed.

A discussion concerning cement sidewalks brought by Mr. Gesser to inform his fellow councilmen that an attempt to foster a trust in the building of cement sidewalks. He asserted that a local firm was charging \$1.25 a yard for gravel and that it could not be bought at all from that firm unless the cement was purchased from them. This method raised the price of cement sidewalk to 11 cents a square foot. A committee was appointed to investigate. The council then adjourned.
