State News

Horse buyers are scouring the country around Eugene for draft horses, which are wanted in Southern California.

The Coffee Club Dance given by the society young ladies of Corvallis, was one of the leading events of the winter of that city.

Simpson's Grille and the A. O. U. W. hall, which were recently destroyed by fire at Albany, are to be rebuilt immediately.

The horse races Saturday at Corvallis were largely attended by out of town people. There was considerable betting going on.

The Eugene meat market, was robbed Monday night of a cash register that weighed over 200 pounds. No trace can be found of it.

Sheep are said to be dying by the thousands in Lake county, where snow is two or three feet deep and crusts. This condition is said to exist north of Warner valley on the desert.

The Elks, the youngest of the fraternal orders represented in Ashland, held its first anniversary Friday evening. More than 200 people from all parts of Southern Oregon attended the affair.

The coroner's jury investigating the death of Stephen Van Houten, the well known Douglas county horseman, found dead at his home in Roseburg Sunday evening, returned a verdict Monday of death by natural causes.

A letter received from Floyd Williams, the O. A. C. graduate and athlete, who is now in the army service in the Philippines, says that he is to remain in Manila until July. He reports everything fine, but the extreme heat and the mosquitoes.

Wm. Cornett, an early pioneer of Oregon, died at his home in Condon, March 16. He first settled in the Willamette valley in 1853, in Polk county, where he resided until 1880, thence going to Lost Valley, Eastern Oregon. He leaves a wife and eight children, two of them being Gene and Frank Cornett of Albany.

J. B. Johnson was thrown 45 feet and horribly mangled by an explosion of dynamite, with which he was shooting stumps, Monday afternoon. The tamping bar with which he had been

working was thrown 20 feet farther. Johnson was clearing land on a ranch belonging to the Hood River Fruit Company, and it is supposed that, while tamping a charge in a stump he accidentally struck the cap. His head was blown off, a leg broken, and a large hole was blown in his side. He leaves a widow and several children.

Skin Grafting to Save Boy Who Was Scalded.

At the North Pacific Sanatorium yesterday Dr. R. C. Coffey, with the assistance of other physicians, performed the operation of skin grafting upon the 15-year-old son of Prof. W. C. Alderson, principal of the public schools at St. Johns. The skin was furnished by a 15-year-old brother of the sufferer.

Three weeks ago scalding water was accidentally thrown over the boy's body and the skin was almost entirely burned off from the waist down. He was removed to North Pacific sanatorium. It is said that he and the brother who furnished the skin are improving as rapidly as could be expected. The operation is said to have been entirely successful.

Prof. Wm. Alderson is a former resident of Salem, and was graduated from Willamette University in 1880. His parents are still residing here.

Wheat Frozen Out.

A dispatch from Walla Walla Monday says:

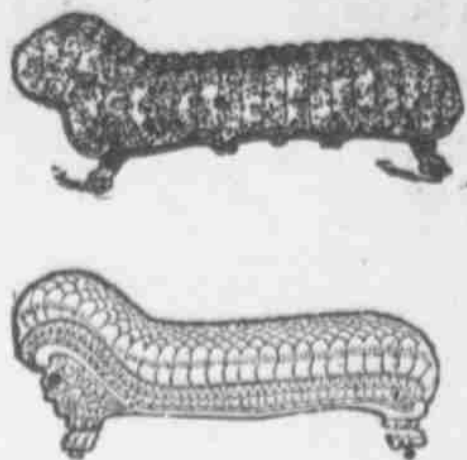
After making a thorough inspection of his extensive land interests, George Drumheller, one of the biggest farmers in Walla Walla county, if not in Eastern Washington, stated this morning that he firmly believes the farmers of Eureka Flat will be compelled to reseed a large percentage of their fall wheat, which has been killed by the late cold snap.

Mr. Drumheller made arrangements today to begin reseeded some 2500 acres of his land lying north of Walla Walla as soon as the weather permits. The loss to Mr. Drumheller alone by the late cold snap will reach in the neighborhood of \$10,000, that being the estimated cost of seeding down the land which he expects to have to reseed.

He gave orders to his foreman today to get the Drumheller teams and seedling outfit in readiness to begin work as soon as the frost is out of the ground. The seed wheat was taken out of the warehouses this morning, and is being prepared for the ground.

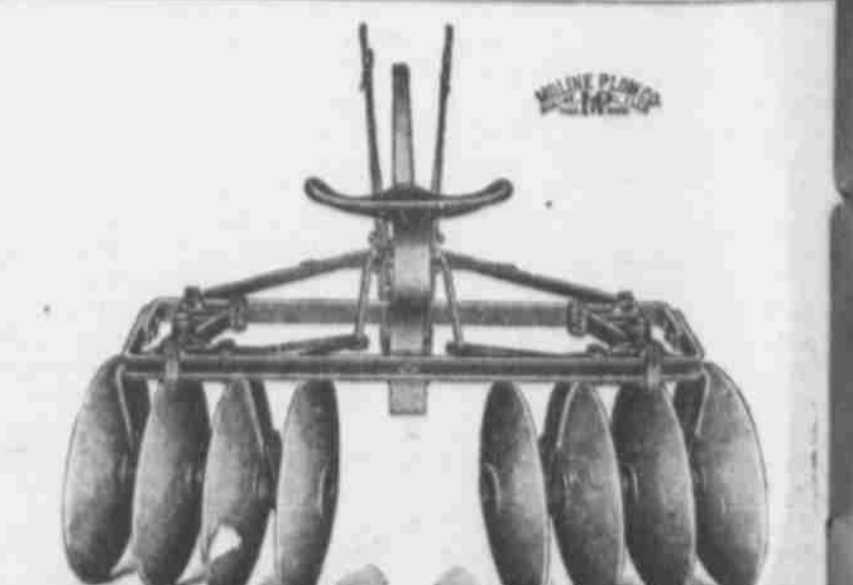
