Competitive Examination.

Company M. O. N. G., of this city, held a competitive examination Monday evening for promotion to the rank of corporal. The applicants were Herman A. Glenn, LeRoy Bullfren, Perry W. Jones, John W. Holmes, Herbert S. Nutter, Archie Humphreys, Osmar K. Wolf and George C. Fenneke.

The candidates were examined by Captain Murphy, Corporals J. W. Lencor and Alfred P. Aufrance. The result will be announced March 27th at the public quarterly inspection, which will be held on that day.

In the state of Washington there are about 7,000 officers, soldiers and employes. About four million dollars per year since 1898 has been expended in their maintenance from government appropriation. The state has at present 33 companies of infantry and artillery, eight troops of cavalry, department headquarters, purchasing quartermaster and commissaries, and the Bremerton navy yard.

Army and navy regulations direct that all things be equal, contract for stores, supplies, forage, etc., shall be purchased in the immediate vicinity of posts. Compare the opportunities presented to people of these three states to dispose of their products and you will have a glimpse of privileges that the people in the states to the north and south have enjoyed, but which have, for some unaccountable reason, been denied to the people of Oregon.

COOS COUNTY SLATE

Attempt of Local Political Manager to Form Combine

—Marshfield, March 20.—(Special to The Journal.)—The Coos Bay Harbor, a local paper here on the Bay, gives out what I am led to believe is the scheme of the ring in Portland. In the issue of last Saturday, it gives the views of one Jo Bennett a former democrat, who now wants to run the republican party. Bennett was recently in Portland, and was hobnobbing around with some of the old ring leaders. Mr. Bennett announces his ticket and advises Coos county people to vote it, as follows:

For congress—S. B. Houston, of Washington.

For governor—C. A. Johns, of Baker.

For secretary of state—Claud Gatech, of Marion.

For state treasurer—Geo. A. Steel, of Multnomah.

For state printer—Willis Duniway, of Multnomah.

So far as my friends are concerned, we will resent this by fairly knocking every man in this combine. Every candidate except those in the combine should also resent it in their locality, and make the movement so hot that it will defeat every one of them. Other candidates should know of combinations, and when a would-be political boss presents a ticket all made out and proposes it as a good one for the voters.

of his county to vote for, it smatters very strongly of combination. Bennett has no standing in the democratic party, and came over to the republican party for office. He is opposed to the primary election law, and wants to become a boss of republican politics. His suggestions will not hurt any candidate whom he does not favor, but it strikes me that the scheme is deeper laid, and will be worked underground through-out the state. Bennett has talked too loud, and let the scheme out of the sack. The political bosses are dying hard, and they want to save the wreck by putting up this kind of a scheme.

The Capital Journal does not believe that Mr. Gatech of this city is a party to any slate like the above. He has never shown a disposition to be a factional or ring candidate, and if Mr. Bennett has made up a slate like the above he has done it without the authority of Mr. Gatech. The Journal is supporting Mr. Wrightman for the office of secretary of state because he stands for the principle of indirect taxation, but it will oppose any mud-slinging or unfair treatment of any of the Marion county candidates for nomination. It is perfectly natural that friends of candidates should try to make up slates and should try to form combinations of various kinds in the interest of friends. We wish to say for Mr. Gatech that he has never in the past shown any inclination to take sides for or against aspirants for the same place, and it has been quoted against him as a political weakness. He is not engaged in the role of a political boss or manipulator trying to make a ticket. We believe if his attention were called to the above slate he would promptly disown it. That is exactly what other gentlemen whose names are included in the alleged slate should do. They should repudiate the effort of any manager at making a slate of any description, and let the primary election be kept free and uncontaminated with boss politics manipulation.—Ed. Journal.

THE HONEST MAN IN POLITICS.

His Duty in Respect to His Party Ticket.

George B. Cox, late republican boss of Cincinnati, has been universally denounced by those who are in a position to know the facts as a man utterly corrupt. He found no defenders and retired under fire. When the result of the last election was known, in which all his candidates were defeated, he promptly announced his immediate and permanent retirement from "politics." For the time being the corrupt organization in Cincinnati is broken, and the "good men" of the city have formed a new club, which is to do "pure politics" exclusively, and to that club President Roosevelt and Secretary Taft have been elected to honorary membership. In acknowledging the compliment, Secretary Taft writes very entertainingly as to the duty of "good citizens" in politics. He says, with truth, that while municipal politics have no connection with national politics, yet it is not possible to prevent nominations under national party names and the use of the machinery of the party organization to elect the candidates. He might have gone farther and said it would be unwise to prevent them. National parties have something to lose and can be more effectively held responsible for bad municipal nominations than any other agency.

Under these circumstances Secretary Taft describes the duty of a good citizen. In brief, it is to do his best within the party to secure good nominations, and, if he fails, to bolt his ticket, using, of course, "a wise discretion" in bolting. The secretary does not define the term wise discretion in the sense in which he uses it. We wish he had, for in the decision as to what is wise and what is unwise lies the whole art of employing one's vote and one's influence with most advantage to the public. What Secretary Taft means is that one should use his own sound judgment and act upon it as circumstances require. Still, there are typical cases in regard to which the views of such a man as Secretary Taft would be useful. For example, when both his own and the opposition party nominate scoundrels, what should an honest man do? Ordinarily, of course, there will be a third or fourth ticket in the field, whose candidates, having little or no chance of election, are presumably personally honest, however cranky they may be. But to vote for one of them would be to throw one's vote away, which is not a good thing. Probably as a rule in such cases, the "good man" does not vote at all, which is certainly unwise, or, since both candidates are rascals, votes for the candidate of his own party. Now that course would not tend to "reform" in his own party, which he probably desires, but to encourage the opposite and saddle the city with a bad official for whom his party must be responsible.

The question arises whether in such a case the "good citizen" ought not to vote for the bad candidate of the other party. The tendency of such a vote is to chastise, and so purify, his own party, while making the opposition party responsible for the bad government which, under the circumstances, is inevitable. This is a very interesting question upon which Secretary Taft's views would have been very valuable if he had given them.—San Francisco Chronicle.
