Adulteration in England.

Vice Consul Hulls of Liverpool reports that there has been a prosecution in England against whisky dealers for selling adulterated liquors, and that the evidence before the court shows how some so-called whisky is distilled. The general manager of the largest distillery company stated that its annual output was 10,000,000 proof gallons of whisky of which only 500,000 gallons was pot proof, the balance being patent still. The latter costs 1 shilling per gallon to produce, the pot still nearly double. The witness further stated that 1 to 14 per cent of malt is necessary to convert the starch into sugar, whisky being defined as "spirit which matures from aging, obtained by distillation from fermented cereals and malt, more malt being used than is necessary to convert starch into sugar." The average of malt used in Irish whisky was stated to be 35 per cent, while for Scotch pot still an average of 50 per cent malt was used, the witness admitting that they advertised the latter as "all-malt Scotch whisky." An attorney stating that Islington whisky is defined as containing 280 parts of impurities to the 1,000,000 parts, another witness re-

sponded: "No alteration of still is needed to produce 3000 parts of impurities to other 1,000,000. All that is needed is to relieve the steam pressure a little and open the spur cock a little more."

Detroit Has Its Dog Show.

Detroit, Mich., March 21.—The first annual dog show under the auspices of the Wolverine Kennel club will open at the Light Guard armory this evening. The exhibition is held under the rules of the American Kennel club and will last four days. There is a total of 250 classes. The list of prizes is quite large considering the fact that this is the first exhibition arranged by the club. Many prominent breeders and kennel clubs have contributed special prizes to be competed for in the different classes. The judges selected for this occasion are James Mortimer, Hempstead, L. I.; J. M. Arent, Hickory Valley, Tenn.; J. J. Lynn, Port Huron, Mich.; Wm. E. Warner, Detroit, and Dudley E. Waters, Grand Rapids, Mich.
