Pentucket Lodge Anniversary.

Lowell, Mass., March 22.—Pentucket Lodge, F. and A. M., will observe the 90th anniversary of the granting of its charter this evening. A dinner will be served at the Masonic temple, and a musical and literary entertainment will follow. Benjamin W. Clement, Lucius A. Derby, secretary, and other officers are in charge of the celebration.

While the first meeting of the lodge was held in a hall located on land now occupied by the Frederick Ayer estate, its installation took place in the old Pentucket Congregational church, which was removed some time ago to give room to the present building. Before proceeding to the church the members of the Pentucket lodge met in the Spaulding residence, corner of Pawtucket and School streets. That build-

ing is still standing and is thought to be the oldest building in Lowell. The property was owned by the grandfather of the late Dr. Joel Spaulding. Dr. Spaulding died in Lowell on January 30, 1888, and his sister, Sarah R., who was his heir, died a few years ago while returning from a trip to Savannah. The property has not been occupied since the death of Miss Spaulding. It has been proposed to purchase the property with funds to be contributed by various historical and patriotic societies and to preserve it as a historical relic. The Molly Varnum chapter D. A. R. has taken the matter in hand and will make an attempt to raise the required fund.

George Bakhtchoff, the first Russian ambassador to Japan ever appointed and the first diplomatic representative of Russia to Japan since the outbreak of the war, accompanied by his wife and attendants, sailed today for Japan on the steamer Korea. The ambassador was formerly Russian minister to Bulgaria. His wife was formerly Miss Beale, daughter of the late General Beale, at one time United States minister to Austria. She is a sister of John R. McLean.

SALEM PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Reporter Goes Through all the Rooms and the Basement

In Principal Peeble's room there were 25 pupils, and the exercise was in advanced grammar. The work was thorough. Mr. Peebles seems to have the respect and perfect good will of all the children. He was teacher of English and history in the Western Normal school. He has perfect order in the arrangements for the marching in and out of all the rooms, and the writer has never seen any better drill work or handling of a large number of children. Professor Peebles has a thorough way of teaching grammar, and imparts a great deal of knowledge that is not contained in the books. He has a long record as teacher and was formerly city superintendent of schools.

Mrs. Chapel teaches the first primary room, and has 34 pupils. They are mostly beginners, and are doing very well.

Miss Starr has the next room, with 35 children. The children were studying soils of different kinds, bringing samples in bottle and discussing them. The children in her room are at the age when they are no longer little ones and are not yet quite big boys and girls, and so have to be kept interested from start to finish. Miss Starr does this very well.

Miss Clark has the next grade—first A and second B. She has been teaching two years at Salem, and has 43 enrolled. Like the other teachers, she teaches the children music, and they sang their new song, "Playtime in Spring," in very fine style, although they had not tried it before that day.

Miss Dayton has 45 enrolled and does the work in third A and fourth B. There is considerable work done in music and drawing.

Mrs. Weninger has 42 pupils, and one of the most orderly rooms we ever visited. It is nearly as neat and clean at night as in the morning before using.

Miss Bean has 36 enrolled and is doing her first year's work. Some of the recitation work is illustrated with water color studies from nature.

Miss Robertson has 51 children enrolled—a very bright lot of boys and girls. Her work in the common branch is very thorough.

C. Unruh is janitor. He has held the position four years. He puts in eight to twelve hours, according to the weather. The basement needs a concrete floor. The septic tank sewerage system works well. There is no smell about the closets, although the boys' closets are too small for the number in attendance. Mr. Unruh has a reputation for being a model janitor and keeps the school rooms and halls clean, well ventilated and comfortable. He is proud of the schools and of North Salem, which is certainly a prosperous part of Greater Salem.
