SALEM HIGH SCHOOL

The Division of Work by the Faculty

Fine Laboratories and Excellent Work by the Grade Teachers

The people of Salem are justly proud of their High school. The attendance is over 250 and they are a very fine body of young men and women. City Superintendent Powers and his aids are all doing good work. They are young men and women with high ideals and not afraid of hard work, and each one earns all the salary paid. Mr. Powers is a progressive man, quiet and undemonstrative, but in close touch with his work, having a firm hand on the main lines and keeping tab on the details of the four large ward schools. The assembly takes place at 9 a. m. and 1 p. m. Principals Mariette and Smith conduct the assemblies, and make all announcements to classes and give out rules and regulations.

Principal Mariette has three classes in geometry, one in political economy, one in advanced rhetoric. City Superintendent Powers has a class in American history at the High school.

Mr. Smith teaches the sciences, three classes in physical geography, of 137 students, and one in botany, one in physics, one in chemistry. There are physical and chemical laboratories.

Miss Swafford has four classes in German and three in algebra. Miss Townsend has six classes in Latin, there being a four-year course. She also has an algebra class.

Miss Richards has six classes in English, rhetoric, grammar and American literature. She is a graduate of Stanford, and has recently won a prize for an article in the Quad.

Miss Clarke teaches five classes in history—general, English, Roman and Medieval history. Her work is altogether with the High school classes.

Athletics is a prominent feature at the Salem High school—teams in baseball, basketball, football and tennis, are maintained—the girls winning the High school championship of Oregon.

The High school maintains two literary societies this year—the Demosthenes and Diogenes—meeting weekly. There are also debating teams, the team going to Roseburg today at 11 a. m.

There is a glee club of about fifty members under the direction of H. C. Epley, one of the board of education. There is also a High school orchestra of eight pieces, making their first appearance at the literary society the other night. There is the beginning of a library, a few dictionaries, reference books and encyclopedias.

Miss Cosper has 40 enrolled as beginners. There are four beautiful photographs of works of art. The little ones learn songs and begin making pictures. They are drilled on vowel and consonant sounds and easy words. In Miss Cosper's room is a large photograph of the most beautiful of all Madonnas—the Defregger. It is the sweetest expression of mature womanhood and tender motherhood ever painted, the work of a gifted Tyrolean peasant artist.

Miss D'Arey has the next grade and the room is full—35. There are many beautiful pictures, including a large Sistine madonna. Miss D'Arey drills the children in beautiful flag songs and her room always is an interesting one to visit. The Salem schools are absolutely democratic. In North school are several colored children, while Miss D'Arey has some bright little Chinese. On the occasion of a visit from Hal D. Patton the other day a surprise was perpetrated by the little ones all whipping out flags and singing patriotic songs.

Miss Byrd has 32 enrolled, 19 to 13 years old. They were singing away like birds in a cage and the blackboard was filled with their work. The Salem school children certainly reflect a high degree of intelligence and prosperity.

Miss Fischer has 42 boys and girls in grade work. They are also carried along in drawing and music. It was early when we called and they had a visit from Carl Hinges, a former student in this grade, who has been away a year in New York and outgrown this grade.

O. T. McIntyre, the janitor, assisted by his son, keeps the building clean and comfortable. By going into any one room he can tell within a degree of the temperature of all rooms.

The grounds about the High school are to be graded soon, and cement walks put in. That will wonderfully improve the appearance of the building.
