CITY ITS OWN BOSS

Judge Galloway Dismisses Injunction and New Telephone Line Can Be Built

Judge Galloway, in department No. 2 of the circuit court for Marion county, handed down, at 1 o'clock today, three decisions, as follows:

In the case of Fleetwood vs. Bell, the court holds that Fleetwood is one of the partners.

In the case of Christensen vs. Arnold, the court overrules the demurrer.

The last and most important case was that of the Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph Company, a corporation, against the City of Salem, a corporation, and Charles E. Sumner, defendant. The judge, in passing upon this case said:

"This is an injunction to prohibit the defendant, Sumner, using the streets of the city of Salem, under the terms of an ordinance granted by the defendant corporation November last for putting in a telephone system to compete with that of the plaintiff corporation.

"The plaintiff contends that the defendant, Sumner, has been granted a franchise on more liberal terms than those of the one under which the plaintiff operates, a franchise that will impose a smaller burden on Sumner than is now imposed on plaintiff. And the plaintiff cites a former ordinance of the city of Salem (No. 396) which provides that the city of Salem shall not grant a franchise for a similar purpose to any other on terms more favorable than those granted to the Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph Company.

"The charter of the city of Salem gives the city council exclusive power to grant telephone and telegraph franchises, and to provide for the use of the streets of the city for the same. Like powers are granted with reference to water, gas, street railway and other enumerated franchises. But nowhere do I find authority for the city council to grant exclusive privileges to any person or corporation, thereby fostering a monopoly, which courts of equity will not encourage.

"It does not appear from facts stated in the complaint that, unless the defendant be enjoined, the plaintiff will suffer irreparable injury. In this suit the testimony has been based too much on theory and speculation to enable the court to determine the amount or extent of damage, if any, to the plaintiff on account of the granting of this franchise to the defendant, Sumner, and the use of the same by him. Neither is the court able to determine the probable amount which the city of Salem may in time receive from the defendant under the terms of his franchise requiring the payment to said city of one per cent of the gross earnings of the new or competing telephone system. It is true that for the first and perhaps the second year the compensation paid to the city by the defendant might be less than that paid by the plaintiff, but the provisions of the ordinance set out in plaintiff's complaint, if held valid, will not be given an interpretation so limited or restricted.

"The suit is therefore dismissed, and the temporary injunction is dissolved."

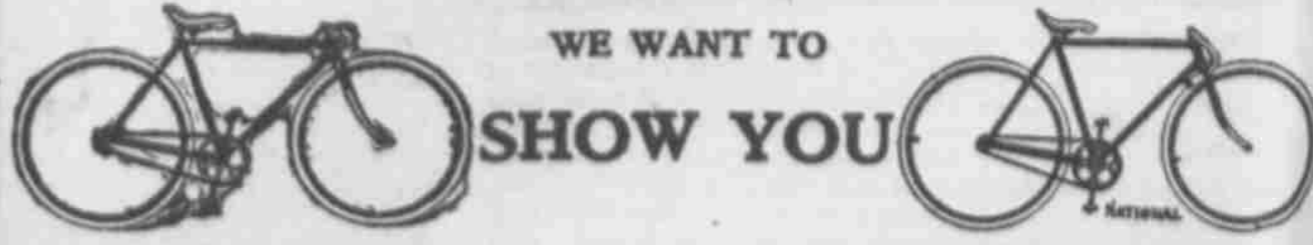
