ORGANIZE SONS OF VETERANS

Commander T. E. Hills, department of Oregon, Grand Army of the Republic, has sent the following letter to a member of the order of Sons of Veterans, of this city:

"Regarding the reorganization of the Sons of Veterans in this department, you will find no one in the ranks of the Grand Army of the Republic that has this at heart more than I, and this was one of the things that I stated to the members of the post in Salem at one of my visits there one year ago.

"The high-water mark in the history of the G. A. R. was reached in 1890, when we numbered 499,489, and since then we have declined with all the recruits we have brought in until the report for 1905, just received, shows our membership to be 232,455, only a remnant of a once mighty host, and now we find the work to be done needs more and younger men, and we look in vain for reinforcements to our depleted ranks, and can only turn to the Sons and Daughters of Veterans, and say to them, come and help us in the work there is to do.

"In my memorial orders, which will be issued very soon, I will extend an invitation to the Sons and Daughters of Veterans to organize, and in the future relieve us of some of the work that we are now doing, and will instruct the commanders of the posts in the department to hand a copy to their local papers and have them published after 30th.

"Thanking you for the interest you are taking in the matter, and hoping that good results will follow, I am your father's comrade, etc."

LOWELL SPEAKS TONIGHT

Senatorial Campaign Opens Tonight at Grand Opera House

Hon. S. A. Lowell, of Pendleton, arrived last night on the overland train, and is at the Willamette hotel today, where many people have called on him. He is a candidate for the United States senate under the direct primary law, and will hold the first meeting under the law in this city at the Grand Opera House this evening.

This is an historical event in the evolution of popular government, and it is worthy of especial notice that Judge Lowell, an Eastern Oregon man, opens his campaign in Salem instead of Portland. He is the candidate of the interior of the state, and while he will have quite a following among the Republicans of Portland, he will get his largest support among the Republicans of the great Inland Empire.

Judge Lowell believes in the law, was one of the men who helped draft the law, and stands for the principle of direct election of senators, for the enforcement of the spirit and principle of the law, rather than for stalling over any of its technical features or the letter of the act.

A few of the political bosses at Salem have tried to prevent Judge Lowell from having an audience in this city, but indications are that the champion of popular rights and of a Republican senator by the direct vote of the Republican masses, instead of by a boss-corrupted legislature, will get a hearing for the greatest reform ever undertaken by the people. The opera house should be packed to the doors to hear this polished orator espouse the new system of making United States senators. His appeal to the people of Western Oregon to stand by the principle and elect a man not under dictation by the Portland machine will not go unheard.

This is the first time a candidate for an important office goes upon the platform and makes his appeal direct to the people. Judge Lowell will discuss national issues aside from election of senators. He is the representative of manhood in politics rather than money. Everybody should go out and hear Judge Lowell this evening.

SOUTH END OF COUNTY BOOMING

The southern end of Marion county is just now the scene of considerable activity among the farmers and along the line of the Southern Pacific railroad. More comfortable homes, better farm buildings and good roads are the ruling spirit.

At all the sidetracks and spurs of the railroad are to be seen great piles of ties and piling, waiting to be loaded on the cars for shipment. At Jefferson the railroad has a big crew excavating for the piers of the new three-span iron bridge, and as soon as the road can procure the cement the crew will be increased and the work rushed to completion.

At Marion the Sidney Power Co. has a steam shovel excavating a new power ditch for the Santiam river. The new ditch is about ten feet wide and four feet deep. The dredge is now working about two miles south of Marion.

Some anxiety is felt by the farmers in the Turner and Marion neighborhood for fear the Santiam river will break through that country during high water. It is stated that the river is eating through the banks just below the ferry east of Marion, and if something is not done, and that soon, it will be beyond repair.
