## WOMAN'S DOUBLE LIFE

A St. Louis dispatch of March 27 says:

Mrs. Florence Knecht, wife of Samuel Knecht of the Luciede Gaslight company, was compelled in the circuit court today to drop the mantle of respectability which she had worn for years and reveal herself as the owner of one of the most notorious resorts in the city.

The revelation came as a shock to the social set in which Mrs. Knecht

moved. For years she has been known as a model wife and devout church goer. She owned a pew in one of the fashionable churches and has been prominent in all social affairs of the church. Her daughter is now being educated in a convent, and so perfectly did the woman maintain her dual role that none of her friends suspected she was anything but what she pretended to be. Even after Mrs. Knecht admitted she was Florence Osborne, the owner of a disreputable house, and she had been arrested several times, her friends found it hard to believe the story.

Mrs. Knecht was compelled to admit her dual life on the witness stand in a suit for divorce she brought on grounds of adultery. After the revelation her suit was dismissed.

### Liverpool National Steeplechase.

Aintree, England, March 30.—The Liverpool grand national steeplechase, which will be run here this afternoon, is one of the great racing events of the year in England and attracts thousands of devotees of the sport to Aintree, usually a very quiet and conservative place. This year there is an unusually large number of Americans here probably owing to the fact that three famous American sportsmen will be represented in the big steeplechase. Foxhall P. Keene has entered Prophet III, Thomas Clyde, Darine and Darth, and Mr. Cotton, Phil May. As the great race is a gentlemen's event, the three owners will ride their own horses in the steeplechase. All three are accomplished riders, who have tried their skill

and endurance many times in cross-country rides.

The entries for this year's race include the king's Australian steeplechaser Moffat, winner of the event two years ago. Moffat would be a great possibility for the long and severe race, were he at his best, but he is now said to be touched in the wind, which is likely to decrease his stamina and his chances are not considered bright. The horse has been a poor investment for the king, who purchased him as a grand national candidate for last year's race to take the place of Ambush II whom he had given out.

It was raised so little comment that an Irish priest at a recent lecture has predicted that Phil May, owned by Mr. Cotton, would win the big race. Many people who have confidence in the prophetic power of the priest referred to, have backed Phil May quite heavily, although the horse will carry 150 pounds. Five pounds more than at last year's steeplechase, when he fell two times from the finish.

### Children Have Planting Day.

Levellille, March 30.—In accordance with the resolution which the school board has passed at the request of the commercial club, today has been designated as "Planting Day" and is observed by the children in all the public schools of the city. Under the supervision of the teachers and principals of the various schools the children were led into the school yards and parks, where they planted the flower seeds distributed among them, under the direction of their teachers.

### Abandonment of Tortugas Station.

Washington, D. C., March 30.—There is a difference of expert opinion in regard to the proposed abandonment of the naval coaling station at Dry Tortugas. Rear Admiral H. B. Bradford, who is responsible for the establishment of the station there, is anxious that the transfer of the place from the navy department to the treasury department shall be approved, while the naval general board has urged that the plant at Dry Tortugas be taken to Guantanamo. Secretary Bonaparte has advised the house naval committee that more than a million dollars has been expended on Dry Tortugas, and that it costs \$3000 a year to maintain the plant. Some of the naval officers who have advised Secretary Bonaparte in the matter have pointed out that the place has now lost its strategic value and would be difficult to defend in case an enemy should seek to make an attack upon the coal pile in time of war. The naval gunnery board is practically committed to a policy which insists upon the fortification of coaling stations, as well as the arming of the coilers. Mr. Bonaparte has advised congress that the treasury department should reimburse the navy department for some of the expenses incurred in establishing the coaling station at Dry Tortugas, although, of course, only a small fraction of the original expense of establishment can be exacted, probably not more than \$200,000.
