WARM WET AND WINDY

Weather Bureau Ventures a Guess But Makes no Official Forecast

If there were anything in averages which would aid in forecasting weather for the coming month, April will be warm, cloudy month, with much rain, some frost and a south wind blowing with considerable force. These are the average conditions for April for a period of 34 years, but the document sent out by the weather bureau, in which the figures are contained, carries the warning that they are not to be constructed as a forecast.

The mean temperature for April is 52 degrees, the average precipitation 3.12 inches, the average number of days on which it rained 15. There are six clear days, ten partly cloudy and 14 cloudy days. The average date of the last killing frost March 17th, and the chances are more than even that there will be none in the coming month.

Some maximum conditions for April given in the report, show that if the worst should happen there might be almost any kind of weather. In April, 1875, the temperature fell to 28 degrees. In April, 1883, there were 7.88 inches of rain, while in 1885, the month showed only 1.12 inches of rain. The greatest rain in any one day was in 1875, when 1.36 inches fell on April 1st. April 3, 1901, had the heaviest snow storm, .62 inches. The highest wind was 46 miles an hour, April 3, 1895.

MEASURES TO SUPPRESS GANGROSA

Washington, March 30.—Gangrosa, a tropical disease more repulsive than leprosy, has become so prevalent upon the island of Guam, that Lieutenant McNamee, U. S. N., Acting governor of the island, has recommended the establishment of a hospital for the isolation of the disease, which is believed to be highly contagious. Admiral Rixey, surgeon general of the navy, has approved the recommendation, and it is likely a \$5000 hospital for cases of the new disease will be erected at once near the leper hospital.

Lieutenant McNamee says the disease destroys the upper part of the face by slow ulceration and is more horrible, to both the victim and his companions than leprosy.

As four cases have already developed Lieutenant McNamee says its isolation is imperative. Naval surgeons have investigated the disease in parts of South America and the West Indies, and their report indicates that there can be little doubt that it is a distinct malady and one which does not yield to the treatment given tuberculosis, leprosy and other diseases common in tropical countries. Cases of gangrosa have been treated in New York, which are believed to have come from Brazil and Panama.
