Mr. Powers has made the Arbor day announcement to the principals of the different schools. It is as follows: "Principals: This is to remind you of Arbor day, Friday, April 13, 1906. It is desirable that the day be appropriately observed by all the schools, and to this end the following suggestions are respectfully offered: 1. Consult the Arbor day manual issued by the state superintendent. 2. Make all plans several days in advance, that teachers and pupils may become thoroughly familiar with them. 3. A suitable literary program is recommended: (a) if the weather is favorable, it is recommended that a part of the day be given to the improvement of the premises and planting of shrubs and seeds. (b) In this case the school should be divided into sections, and each section assigned certain work. 4. Pupils of the first two grades may have their programs apart from the rest of the school. (5) Parents should be invited to be present and share in the program. 6. Keep in mind the chief purpose of the day. Try to impress on all present the importance of beautiful surroundings. 7. It is earnestly urged that the day be not allowed to pass without some attempt at proper observance. The time is at hand even in this state, when a restraining hand must be put on the instruction of the great natural beauties. Nowhere better than in the schools, can influence be exerted. Cadets Must Be Gentlemen.

West Point, N. Y., April 3.—General A. L. Mills, superintendent of the military academy, has administered by special orders an unusual rebuke to a member of the first class, Cadet George E. Byrd, who was charged with using an expression which referred to an officer, and with the intention of showing disrespect while walking near him. The offending cadet will be confined to certain limits of the reservation un-

til June 10, and walk a stipulated number of punishment tours. General Mills, in commenting on the case, said: "In imposing this punishment the superintendent wishes to call attention to the childishness of Cadet Byrd's offense, and his deplorable lack of appreciation of the dignity of his position. For a little boy to attempt to hide his identity in a group of his fellows, or to conceal himself in any other way, and, so hidden, to call derisively at one of his instructors, is quite in harmony with what might be expected. For any cadet, especially one of the first class, to so far forget the dignity of his position, is to cast upon himself the grave suspicion of being unfitted to undertake the responsibilities of the position he is being trained to occupy. To intentionally try to wound the feelings of another man who is simply doing his duty, and without giving him an opportunity of who it is that offers him such an indignity, it a violation of the accepted idea of what constitutes a gentleman, a man distinguished for fine sense of honor, strict regard for his obligations, and consideration for the rights and feelings of others."
