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ELECTION DATES TO REMEMBER

- Registration books for primary election close April 10. Primary election April 20. Registration books again opened April 25 and close May 15. Last day for filing names for state and district offices March 30. Last day for filing names for county offices April 4. Conveying votes for nominating state and district candidates May 5. Last day for filing nominating petitions for county offices May 19. Last day for filing certificates of nomination May 5. General election June 4.

DEPOSIT OF STATE FUNDS.

Among the six different aspirants for the Republican nomination as treasurer Hon. John H. Aitkin, of Huntington, is the only one who has come out unequivocally in favor of a radical change in the existing method of handling state funds. SOME OF THESE GENTLEMEN HAVE NOTHING WHATEVER TO SAY in regard to this highly important subject, while the others conveniently dodge the issue, by somewhat gauzy and intangible explanations.

MR. AITKIN DOES NOT DODGE. He announces his position so plainly that no one may be misled. "I am absolutely in favor of the creation of a board, consisting of the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer, which shall have complete control of where the deposits of state monies shall be made," declared Mr. Aitkin. "I also say that any interest accruing from these deposits should be the property of the state."

This has long been a leading question in Oregon, but a candidate to place himself squarely on record and go before the people with this as one of the principal plans in his platform is phenomenal.

REMEMBER THE FARMERS.

There are a few farmers who are candidates for places on the legislative ticket in this county that the city politicians better not overlook.

There is Alex LaFollette, of Mission Bottom, for senator, and Jerome Simmons, of Monitor, and Jerome Jones of Macleay, for representatives.

They are good men and all-around farmers, WHO MAKE THEIR LIVING BY FOLLOWING THE PLOW AND CULTIVATOR, and are not county jobbers for office.

The Republicans of Marion county will do well to pay some attention to this kind of men in making up a ticket. THE FARMERS MUST BE ON THE TICKET.

These men are substantial men, men who make their living, and who have not been working the state or the county for petty jobs for a living.

James, of Macleay, or Oklahoma Jones, has seen service in Kansas and in Oklahoma, in the Republican party. He has a host of friends among the farmers of the hills.

While he is a new man in county politics, don't pick him up for a sucker. He is one of the single-cut kind of politicians, WHO LIGHTS ON HIS FEET, NO MATTER WHERE YOU DROP HIM.

It didn't take him three minutes to study out the fallacy of such a scheme as the Tuttle law, and see its injustice. The average farmer has more common sense, and is safer to trust in the legislature than most city politicians.

THE SHAW CIRCULAR.

A prairie farmer at Liberty by name of Shaw has written a letter in this congressional campaign attacking Prof. Hawley as a candidate for congress on the Republican ticket, because a few years ago he called John Brown, of Ossawatimie a murderer, liar, thief and traitor.

He has dug up the resolutions ADOPTED BY THE GRAND ARMY POST AT EUGENE condemning Prof. Hawley for the language and sentiments then expressed, and says he is the only American history teacher taking that view of the immortal John Brown, whose soul goes marching on.

The Shaw circular contains a letter from Commander Chapman, of Geary Post, G. A. R., who also took exceptions to the lecture on John Brown delivered by Prof. Hawley, and a letter from Salmon Brown, of Portland, BON OF OLD JOHN BROWN, DEFENDING HIS FATHER.

We have reached a more commercial age when the foundation stones of Republicanism laid by men like John Brown, have almost sunk out of sight. Mr. Hawley probably realizes that he put his foot in it on that occasion, and now teaches a different kind of history of those days of trouble and bloodshed.

As Shaw says, the old Grand Army men are not numerous any more, and are not consulted about politics. IT IS BEST TO BURY THE INCIDENT. Where Hawley was raised, in Benton county, there were a great many members of the Methodist church South, and they honestly believed and taught that John Brown was a murderer.

But their political views did not prevail, and the statue of John Brown in the city of Washington, carrying a negro child on his arm, on his way to execution, may never have occasion to blush at Prof. Hawley's little side-step in teaching that the abolition hero was a murderer.

ENGINE MAKES A SNEAK

Standing lonely and unattended in her stall at the Second street round house this morning, engine No. 327, of the Northern Pacific railroad, was seized with a desire to see the world. The absent engineer had placed nourishing fire under her boiler, and life-giving steam was beginning to course through her iron veins.

For years No. 327 had obediently fetched and carried about the yards, always within narrow prescribed limits and always with a dusky engineer and a dusky fireman to direct her movements.

No volition had ever been allowed her, but now a chance to assert her individuality seemed open. Impatient of restraint, No. 327 shook herself petulantly, and, behold! her throttle clicked over a notch, and the hissing steam stole into her cylinders. The joy of freedom made 327 a new engine.

A thrill of life along her keel! Conscience of No. 327. No one was watching, and the great engine quietly and hesitatingly, yet with determination, slid out of the smoky dungeon into the clear, pure air of the smiling morning. Difficult Wrecking Job.

Similar turntable accidents are rare, and present difficulties to the wrecking crew. Occasionally an engine goes into the open pit head-on, and then the task is a simple one. The engine is jacked up, an inclined track is placed under it, and another engine drags it up the grade.

But in this case the wrecked engine lies on her side, and will have to be lifted bodily, meanwhile the turntable is blocked, and all engines in their stalls are prisoners until the pit is cleared.
