Judge Ryan's record as a public officer proves him a man of business, well fitted to perform every duty required of the state treasurer.

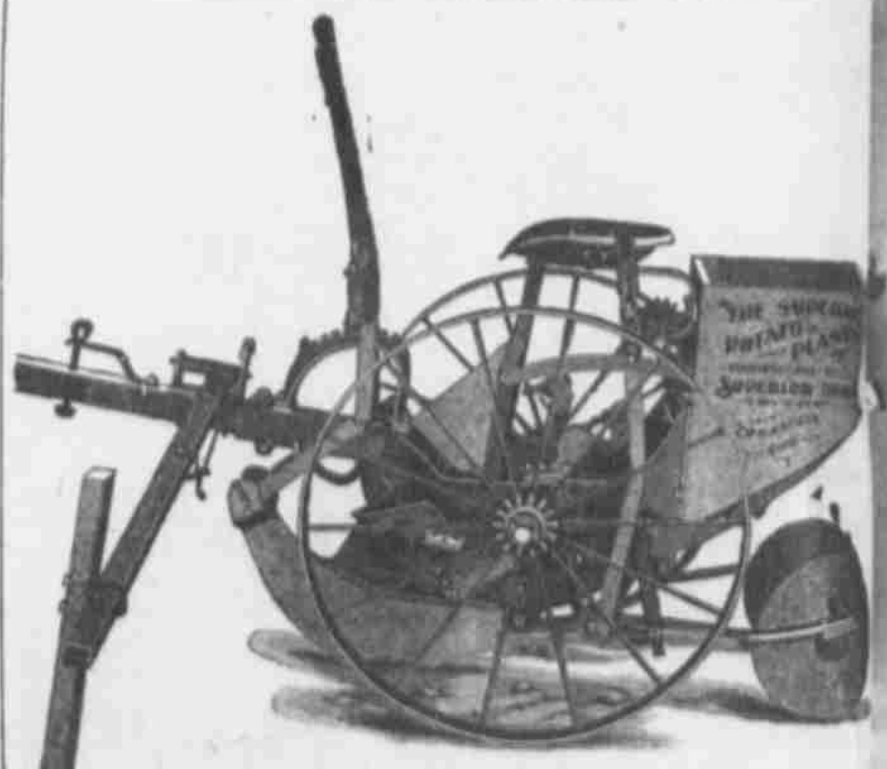
