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A DRAMA PLAYED IN THE HILLS

Murderer Flees From the Officers

And People of Baker City, by the Aid of
Glasses, Follow a Twenty Mile Chase
Across the Bunch Grass Hills

Realistic Drama of Two Hours' Duration That Holds the
Audience Without the Aid of Music

Pursued by a posse of armed men, people watching the flight through glasses. The figures of the men were easily discernable, and excitement among the watchers ran high.

Trivial Cause of Murder.

The murder was committed over a most trivial cause. The Jacksons, five brothers and two sisters, had lately divided up their father's estate, which is a valuable tract of land lying between Baker and South Baker. The Jackson brothers run a dairy.

Andrew Jackson had been grading his lots and those of one of his sisters, Mrs. Endicott. This sister engaged him a few days ago to grade up an irrigation ditch, which ran through the center of one of her lots and waters the Carey Jackson garden.

This morning Carey Jackson and his brother-in-law, Warren Matthews, went into the lot where Andrew was at work and told him that he must stop work on the ditch. Andrew replied that he would not, as he was acting as his sister's hired man.

Andrew Jackson Threatened.

Carey Jackson and Matthews, according to the story of Mrs. Endicott, sister of the Jacksons, answered by telling him that "the hired man was going to get licked, and if that would not make him stop, there would be a little shotgun play." They then left the field and Andrew Jackson hurried to the house and armed himself with a revolver.

About 6 o'clock that evening Carey Jackson and Matthews returned to the field, armed with clubs and commenced belaboring Andrew Jackson, so Mrs. Endicott avers. Andrew drew his revolver when attacked, and attempted to shoot his brother Carey, but Matthews rushed upon him and tried to wrest his weapon from him. In so doing he caused his own death, for he received the bullet from the revolver in the left temple, and was killed instantly.

Slayer Escapes on Horse.

Carey turned to help Matthews, and Andrew unhitched one of his work horses from the scraper, and struck out up the ridge toward the mountain.

The story of a neighbor woman does not exactly coincide with that of Mrs. Endicott. This woman says that, while she knew no particulars of the trouble, she is positive that Carey Jackson and Matthews did not attack Andrew with clubs, but that he commenced the trouble by shooting Matthews.

It is about half a mile from the Jackson place to police headquarters, and a boy rode down on a bicycle, calling for the police. It was just 6 o'clock, and all the officers were at dinner, excepting C. Y. Kellogg, of the mounted police. He boy was so excited that he could not give any intelligible information, and Kellogg struck off on his horse for the Jackson place. Arriving there, he saw Andrew going up the ridge, and, sending a messenger back for assistance, Kellogg followed Andrew.

New York, March 6.—Delphina Love, daughter of the late Dr. I. N. Love, of St. Louis, the best known physician in the country, and very wealthy, jumped from a hotel window here this morning, and died of injuries, after a night of unconventional revelry with a male companion, who was arrested for intoxication, but later released. The girl, through her Bohemian ways, forced the family to leave St. Louis. Her father died aboard a steamer, going to England, and Delphina went on the stage, and became well known in Bohemian circles.

Another Paper Railroad.

Portland, April 6.—Contracts were let today for two of the four sections of the Wallula Pacific road which parallels Hill's new line down the north bank of the Columbia to Portland, to Giesbech and Joplin, who have the contract for the construction of the Western Pacific to San Francisco. Work begins next week. President Geslinger announces the right of way is practically all secured. It is believed that the St. Paul is back of the road, which will probably bridge the Columbia at Troutdale, entering Portland over the Oregon Water Power Company's tracks.

Holding Its Primaries.

Naples, Italy, April 6.—The eruption of Mount Vesuvius is now most violent. On the Pompeii side the main stream of lava has divided, one stream threatening Otto Nane, a town of 30,000 inhabitants, and the other is threatening Terredel Greco, with a population of 30,000. The danger is immediate, and calls for the evacuation of Boscoreale village which is nearest the crater, and has a population of 9000 souls. From the new crater, which is 20 feet in circumference, the lava has already flowed two and a half miles.

Mormons in Session.

Salt Lake, April 6.—The semi-annual conference of the Mormon church opened in the big tabernacle today with the largest attendance from outside points in years. Interest centers in the election of another apostle vice Merrill, deceased. Rumors are that is opposition to sustaining the apostles, who, it is alleged, have taken wives since the manifesto.

Miners Are Winning.

New York, April 6.—It is believed it is almost certain that the operators will accept the miners' proposition for arbitration. It is thought Mitchell's move has placed the operators where they must accept or be placed before the public as in an unyielding mood. The operators realize that they need every bit of public sentiment in their favor they can get.

Vienna, April 6.—A settlement of the quarrel between the Emperor and the Hungarian leaders was reached today.

PROPHET WITHOUT HONOR

Lawyers Hurry to Meet the
Old Fake to Give Advice,
and Get Money

Chicago, April 6.—Answering to Dowie's defiant cry from Mexico that he is coming to fight, his friends, old and new, are rallying to the support of excommunicated first apostle, and are willing to spend their time, energy and money to aid in restoring him to his own. His legal advisers are hurrying toward the southwest to meet Dowie and advise him as to the situation, and plans the best to adopt to act against Voliva. Possibly they will secure an injunction restraining Voliva from interfering with the Zion properties.

Coming Back as Moses.

A private telegram from Dowie to his adherents announces he will return to Zion late Monday night in the role of Moses, and will perform a miracle to prove his authority. He promises to bring \$10,000,000 in gold.

Dowie's announcement is accompanied by threats of dire calamity which is to fall upon all his detractors. Voliva's followers are at prayer, and have solemnly vowed to stand by their new leader, and to prevent, by force, if necessary, Dowie's entry into Zion.

Mrs. Dowie, before the meeting of the Zion women today, declared she would not desert Dowie. She said he did wrong, but not wilfully. Being possessed of an "unclean spirit," she asked the women to pray that his "devils be cast out," and urged the women to be courageous and not collapse, or they would be of little use to Zion.

John Alexander Dowie was born in Edinburgh on May 25, 1847. He left Scotland for Adelaide, South Australia, when he was 13, and for seven years served as clerk in a mercantile establishment. On the money he saved he returned to Scotland in 1867 and took a five years' course in the University of Edinburgh. He graduated from the divinity school, took orders in the Congregational church, and in 1872 returned to Australia. Six years later he deserted the Congregationalists and branched out as an evangelist and faith healer. He went to Melbourne, erected a huge tabernacle there, and in ten years had built up a large congregation.

Yearning for larger fields, he came to San Francisco in 1889, but after a long crusade was driven from the city. Two other attempts to gain a foothold on this coast failing, he moved eastward, locating in Chicago. In the spring of the World's Fair year he conceived the idea of Zion City. His followers increased rapidly and, although he clashed with the authorities, was driven out of South Chicago, chased out of Pullman, stoned, mocked and arrested, cleared himself and gained power.

On February 22, 1896, Dowie organized the Christian Catholic Church of Zion and appointed himself general overseer. His work attracted thousands from all over the country. Then he purchased a big tract of land and several buildings. By vast strides he organized his colony, until he became an absolute power. In 1900 his aggressive policy led to his being mobbed on several occasions, but the advertising only added to the growth of his following. In August, 1901, ground was broken for the first house in Zion City on a large tract he had been quietly acquiring for a year. The city limits included 7628 acres of land. At Dowie's call the Zionists assembled there from all parts of the country. Dowie went to England, enlisted the services of a relative named Stevenson and started a lane factory, importing experts from Nottingham to teach his people the art. He built schools, a hospital and a tabernacle to seat 7000 persons. In two years he had opened a vast general store, a big printing office and a candy

THINK HE DOPED COFFEE

Man in Heppner Smashes the
Dishes, and Is Charged
With Attempt at

Heppner, Or., April 6.—A mysterious attempt at wholesale poisoning, resulting in the serious illness of several persons, through the placing of oxalic acid in coffee served at a boarding house, conducted by Miss Mary Behrens, caused great excitement here last night. J. N. Bode, step-father of Miss Behrens has been arrested. In a fit of rage yesterday he went to Miss Behrens' house, smashed the dishes and broke up the furniture. The evidence that he placed the poison in the coffee is only circumstantial.

Indianapolis, Ind., April 6.—John H. Winder, leader of the bituminous "stand pat" operators, today telegraphed Roosevelt and Mitchell that the bituminous operators of Ohio proposed to settle the strike in the bituminous districts on the same terms that Mitchell proposes to the anthracite operators, by arbitration. Winder's associates say Mitchell is caught in his own trap, and is placed in the same position before the public as he himself placed the anthracite operators.

The governor set aside two days two weeks apart so as to allow for an adjustment of the celebration in accordance with climatic conditions.

Just at the zenith of his success Dowie, on June 3, 1901, declared himself to be Elijah III, and from that moment his downfall began. In 1903 he invaded New York with 3000 of his followers at a cost of \$300,000, and after a campaign against his which lasted two weeks Zion City was invaded by its creditors. Dowie promptly left his followers in the lurch and went to Australia via England, but after a brief but stormy visit to that country he returned and essayed to place Zion City on a paying basis again. Failing in this, he attempted to divert attention by starting a colony in Mexico. Then his health and his colonial nerve failed and he sought a refuge in Jamaica and later in Mexico, where he is now.
