CLEWS AND
MONEY
TALK

New York, March 31.—Uncertainty regarding monetary conditions and the coal strike exerted a decidedly retarding effect on the stock exchange. Prospects of the coal crisis are very much mixed. Conditions seem unfavorable for the miners, inasmuch as there is a large stock of coal on hand, and it is asserted that as a class they are already much better off than usual, and that trade conditions do not warrant a further advance in wages. The dispute, however, is still in a critical state, and while the probabilities favor some sort of compromise the outcome is still uncertain. Mr. Mitchell seemed anxious to avoid an open rupture; yet it was difficult to see how he could do so without a backdown—something which, as a matter of prestige, he could scarcely afford to do. A strike at this time is especially unfortunate, because of its effect upon an over-sensitive and somewhat hysterical state of public opinion. The latter is considerably increased at the abuses of both organized capital and organized labor, and it realizes that any concessions to the latter must result in an increased price for a commodity which is already selling at abnormally high figures. It is quite evident that a prolonged rupture between capital and labor at this time would accentuate the public demand

for government interference—a policy from which, in the end, organized labor would suffer just as much as organized capital. With such momentous problems at issue it is not surprising that stock market operations are held in abeyance until the atmosphere in this respect becomes more clear.

The monetary situation has much improved. Temporary stringency was anticipated previous to April 1, but the disturbances from this cause have been much less than expected. Funds are still retained in the interior with greater tenacity than usual owing to continued activity in industrial and mercantile affairs. Local bank reserves continue too low, and the contraction in loans has not been radical enough to permit of any important re-enforcement. The chief relief in the local situation has come from Europe, where in case of necessity it is known that we can obtain assistance. Moderate amounts of gold have come this way, but relief is usually obtained through extension or expansion of our credit in the foreign markets. Owing to the improved outlook of the Moroccan question foreign bankers are more inclined to give New York the assistance it desires; and the only present hindrance to a further utilization of this source is the probability that Russia and France also will soon be large borrowers in the international markets. The Russian loan for \$200,000,000, it will be remembered, was postponed last winter because of the internal disturbances then existing. Fortunately, the Russian government has demonstrated its ability to temporarily at least repress disorder. Its financial necessities, however, have probably been increased rather than diminished by these events, and the Russian treasury cannot indefinitely postpone its loan. A partial issue of \$50,000,000 has already been made and other instalments are likely to follow. Russia endeavored to establish financial connections in New York, but fortunately Americans do not take kindly to Russian loans, and the probability is that those who have already been large lenders to that government will be compelled to continue their assistance as a matter of self-interest and protection. The foreign demand for American securities shows a slight improvement, particularly from Dutch sources; but this demand is not sufficient to have any material influence upon values.

The immediate outlook of the market is encouraging. We have suffered considerable reaction and in view of present general business activity there is little chance for further depression, unless the coal situation turns out unfavorably. Somewhat better buying of stocks has been noticeable at times, and the liquidation by large speculators seem to have ended for the time being. On April 1 between \$60,000,000 and \$70,000,000 of dividends will be distributed; a much larger amount than usual at this season owing to the active business done by the big industrial corporations. Temporarily, at least, this will have a beneficial effect. Further, we are now approaching the entrance of spring, when the market is generally inclined to be strong and pessimism at a minimum. Technical conditions are, therefore, quite favorable for a moderate recovery in values. Later on much will depend upon the crop outlook, which up to date is satisfactory. Forward mid-summer we may expect the usual quiet, particularly as the summer exodus abroad promises to be much

larger than usual. During the summer more or less political agitation of a disturbing sort will be heard owing to preparations for the congressional elections. The spread of socialistic theories and the open threat of labor to enter the political arena naturally create a feeling of disquiet, coming at a time when public opinion has been overwrought and depressed by recent insurance disclosures. In the long run all of these exposures, discussions and political disturbances will be beneficial and result in a larger degree of public good and increased stability. This period of self-searching and transition, however, is likely to be one of more or less disquiet and the matter which receives serious consideration in high financial circles. For the present, however, as already stated, the outlook is satisfactory and good securities can be bought with reasonable confidence on all pronounced declines, but profits should be taken upon the good rallies. For the next few days the controlling influence is likely to be the coal strike.

General Beauregard, who succeeded to the command, called off the battle too soon, and the next day Grant's forces, reinforced by Rell's army of 25,000 men, regained their lost positions and slowly pressed back the army of Beauregard, which, after two days of hard fighting, fell back to Corinth.

Murderer Castro Electrocuted.

Columbus, O., April 6.—Fred Castro, alias Frank Connors, who was sentenced to death for the murder of Detective Higgins of the Erie, Pa., police force, was executed today by electrocution to expiate his crime. Castro pleaded guilty to another murder, that of Officer Dan Davis. Castro shot and killed Davis when the latter, with several other officers, surprised him and his accomplices while they were burglarizing the residence of Horace Chapman in this city on June 7 of last year. The condemned man was formerly of Flint, Mich., where his parents, said to be respectable people, still live.

Castro asked for a new trial, but the motion was denied. He remained perfectly cool and firm to the last. A short time ago, when the remark was made that there was a strong agitation in favor of abolishing the death penalty in this state, Castro expressed himself strongly opposed to such a course. "I am against the abolition of capital punishment," he said, "although death is staring me in the face. The abolition of the death penalty would lead to a terrible state of affairs in Ohio."
