Jay Has a Contract.

North Yakima, Wash., April 6.—Superintendent Jay Lynch, of the Yakima Indian reservation, has been directed by the Indian department to confiscate the property of drug stores at Toppenish on the reservation, if the practice of selling liquor to Indians is not stopped.

Mr. Lynch is in a quandary how to interpret such apparently revolution ary measures to abolish one bad feature of life on the lands under his jurisdiction. He came here today from Port Simons to secure the advice of his attorney. When he finds out where he stands as to the responsibility in taking such steps he will carry out instructions of the department or turn them down.

For months past life on the Yakima Indian reservation has been worse than during the days when the Siwash were on the warpath.

Drug stores have been selling whisky openly on the reservation, so Mr. Lynch states in a communication to the prosecuting attorney of this county, and they have made a regular hell on earth at Toppenish. Conditions have become so bad that it is unsafe for white men to live in that city, and some of the merchants are talking of leaving. The practice of selling liquor to Indians has a tendency also to discourage development of Indian lands by whites.
