BOOTH KELLY-KLAMATH

Southern Oregon Timber Men Are Generous --- Who's Which and What?

The attention of Governor Chamberlain and State land Agent West was recently called to a bill introduced by Senator Fulton, giving the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company the right to exchange land in the Klamath reservation for an equal area of Indian land, in order that its holdings may be in compact form.

The Booth-Kelly Company obtained title to these lands by purchase from the Oregon Central and Military Company, and in a suit for possession of lands inside the reservation, won on a technicality.

The state has an adverse claim to about 15,000 acres of land claimed by the company by reason of its being swamp land. Suit is pending in the supreme court, which, if decided in favor of the state, will overturn both the Booth-Kelly claim and the adverse ruling of the secretary of the interior.

In order to get a correct idea of the foregoing bill, Governor Chamberlain sent a telegram to Senator Fulton, asking him to send a copy of the bill authorizing the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company to select lands in lieu of holdings in Klamath reservation, and to postpone action until investigation here.

At noon today Senator Fulton wired back: "Mailing you copy of the bill today; it simply authorizes exchange of lands as per agreement with department."
