Art Societies to Merger.

New York, April 7.—The merger of the Society of American Artists and the National Academy of Design having been definitely decided upon, preparations are now progressing to perfect the joint organization. Dedicate Wisconsin Monument. Pittsburg Landing, Tenn., April 7.—Wisconsin veterans of the Civil War have come here from all parts of the country to attend the dedication of the Wisconsin monument, which has been erected on the battlefield of Shiloh. A large delegation of veterans representing the Fourteenth, Sixteenth and Eighteenth Wisconsin volunteer infantry and other Wisconsin regiments arrived here this morning and were received by the local reception committee.

The exercises on the battle field will take place in the afternoon, and a highly interesting and elaborate program has been prepared for the occasion. Jacob Fawcett, a prominent attorney of Omaha, who was at one time one of the Judges of the Nebraska supreme court, will deliver the dedicatory address. Mr. Fawcett was born and reared in Wisconsin and went to war as a private in the Sixteenth Wisconsin volunteer infantry. He took part in the battle of Shiloh and was wounded there.
