HORSE EDITOR THERE

Tries To Talk Horse Sense About Woman Which is a Senseless Thing to Try

Anna Shaw faced an audience in the First Methodist church last evening that must have made her proud. There was not even standing room when she walked up the aisle, a few minutes late, and took a seat back of the demure little pulpit. Some of the audience recognized her and gave her a rather faint bit of applause, probably because many were not quite sure that she was the real thing—but she was.

It is not worth while to even try to tell the preliminary program, because after hearing Anna Shaw, there wasn't any preliminary. Governor Chamberlain, in his happy way, introduced her, but if he said anything, which he must have done, it is forgotten in the after-math.

It would be a bold man, indeed, who would undertake to criticize Anna Shaw, from an intellectual or literary standpoint. Physically, personally she is at first—well—with all proper apologies to her, rather a disappointment. She is just a trifle given to embarrassment that, if we hadn't heard her talk, we would have called fat. She has, however, of fine stage presence, gray of hair, too gray to quite fit with the bright eyes and youthful face which it crowns, but—well, if Anna Shaw is gray her talk isn't. When she handed "Our George" back a bit of taffy for his pretty little introductory speech (whatever it was) she sure put sugar in it; and then when she put her elbows on the little pulpit, smiled down on the big gathering of Salemites and took them into her confidence, well, this is what she did—she took them in. Of course, there were some who did not agree with Anna Shaw's ideas concerning suffrage, but there were no one but that appreciated the way in which those ideas were presented.

Yet, through it all there seemed just a trifle of discord. To illustrate: The lecturer's tribute to motherhood, her picture of home, "which only a woman can make," her dainty word-painting of the young mother with the boy, her baby boy, at her breast; and whom she was training to be "a voter," all flowers of language. And yet it was Miss Shaw, not Mrs. Shaw, who painted this picture.

Somewhat a homeless woman drawing a word picture of home; a woman who has never known the joys of motherhood, who has never gathered in her hungry arms the little one; flesh of her flesh—soul of her soul, life of her life—who has never felt the touch, the joy, of infantile lips drawing sustenance from her generous breast, who has never felt the clasp of little clinging fingers. Oh, well. Somehow it doesn't ring quite true. Miss Shaw is eloquent. She is attractive, she is brilliant, but she is still a—Miss.
