SALEM
STREETSMeeting Held to Promote
Their Early Improve-
ment

There was a well-attended meeting of the North Salem Improvement League at the African M. E. church. There were no ladies present, owing to an error in the announcement in The Journal, which set the time for meeting on the 17th. Those present entered into the spirit of public improvements in a hearty manner, and decided to hold another and a larger meeting on the 24th inst., the date of the next. Addresses were made by Alderman Jacobs and Alderman Prasier and others in favor of an aggressive campaign of street improvement. Committees were named to get up petitions for about six streets, to grade, drain and gravel the same. Plans were shown by which a 30-foot wide street raised two feet in the center, and graveled ten feet wide, makes a clean, dry road summer and winter at a cost of about \$15 per block. This would be less than \$2 per 30-foot lot on each side of the street. The meeting of Tuesday night is certain to bear some fruit.

FLAG
RAISINGLarge Crowds and Fine Bas-
ket Dinner at School
House

There was a flag-raising and basket picnic at the school house in the Ed. Downing neighborhood, four miles east of Stayton, Tuesday, when Patton Bros., the Salem booksellers, gave that district a fine large American flag.

The district board of directors had erected a fine staff, with pulley and ropes, the ladies of the neighborhood provided a splendid dinner, the teacher, Miss Annen, had a patriotic program of songs and recitations, and the farmers furnished the children and the crowd. The mothers were there with the babies for the candidates to kiss, and the people generally turned out. Ed. Downing, who is a great friend of the public schools, and has always taken a big-hearted interest in whatever pleases the boys and girls of that neighborhood, was master of ceremonies, and two boys about six years old, bedecked with red, white and blue sashes, hoisted Old Glory to the breeze. Each child was decorated with an American flag, and the whole affair was a very happy one.

Patton Charms the Crowd.

Hal Patton led in the singing of the patriotic songs and made a talk for the flag as usual, giving its history, telling its origin and some stories about its triumphs and glorious achievements. This is a strongly German neighborhood, and the people are prosperous. The children look sturdy and healthy, and there are plenty of them. After the dinner was served, and it was one of the finest ever set up on such an occasion, Col. E. Hofer told the children some bear stories. The story of the bear that loved honey and got into trouble had an application in political affairs that all caught onto, and, after a general good social time, the crowd separated. This makes about the 30th flag that Patton Bros. have donated to the public schools of the county. Each flag costs from six to ten dollars, and in some parts of the county one cannot travel out of sight of the Stars and Stripes when the public school is in session. Their next flag raising will be at Pruitland, Friday, April 13th.

About Mixed Bloods.

In answer to an inquiry from M. F. Parker, of the Klamath Indian Agency, relative to the state of so-called Indians, viz: half quarters, and other mixed bloods, at the polls, "permit me to say that the question really is whether they are considered Indians or whites, and if held to be Indians, they have the right to vote if they have severed their tribal relations and have adopted the habits of civilization, or if they have received allotments of lands under the United States laws."

As to the status of one-fourth bloods and half bloods, I am of the opinion that a one-fourth blood would be considered a white person and a citizen, and entitled to vote, while a half blood if his mother was an Indian woman and his father a white man, would be considered an Indian, the child taking the status of his mother.

The attorney general refers Mr. Parker to an opinion given by him to J. W. Evans, assistant superintendent of the Klamath Indian reservation, in which he answers the question and holds in substance: that all Indians who have received lands by allotment are citizens of the United States, and entitled to the right to vote, together with all other rights, privileges and immunities of such citizens.

From Portland to Klamath Bay; from Tillamook Bay to Coos Bay; from Tillamook Bay to Nehalem; from Coos Bay to Humboldt Bay, Cal.; from Siuslaw Bay easterly via Siuslaw and Willamette valley to a point in the southern part of Malheur county, and on the south or east boundary line of the state of Oregon. Also to build purchase and operate steamships between Coos Bay, Tillamook Bay, Astoria, Portland, San Francisco and other ports in the North Pacific, and steamboats on the Columbia, Willamette, Yaquina, Siuslaw, Umpqua, Coquille and other rivers emptying into the Pacific ocean.

The principal office of the company is to be in Portland, and the capital stock is \$10,000,000. The organizers are: W. J. Wiley, John M. Eddy, and William M. Gregory.
