

Trust to Nature.

Indiana Republican Convention.

Indianapolis, Ind., April 11.—Everything is in readiness for the Republican State Convention which will open its session at Tomlinson's hall this afternoon. The number of delegates who will attend the convention this year is 1841, larger than ever before in the history of the state. Many of the delegates arrived yesterday, while the majority of them arrived here this morning. During the forenoon the various district delegations held meetings to elect officers and members of various committees of the convention. At the same time tickets entitling the delegates to admission to the convention hall were distributed by the district chairmen. Immediately after these meetings the members of the various committees selected held meetings to arrange the preliminaries. These meetings were held at the Claypool hotel.

Representatives C. B. Landis and A. L. Brick are mentioned for presiding officers of the convention, one as temporary, the other as permanent chairman. At the meeting this afternoon the chairman will deliver the opening address, which will give the keynote for the coming campaign. Several prominent Republican senators and representatives may deliver addresses. The rest of the afternoon session will be devoted to the reports of the various committees and their consideration. No nominations will be made.

The convention will convene at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning, to nominate candidates for the following offices: Secretary of state, auditor of state,

state treasurer, attorney general, clerk of the supreme court, superintendent of public instruction, state geologist, state statistician, one judge of the supreme court for the first district, one judge of the supreme court for the fourth district, two judges of the appellate court for the first district and three judges for the appellate court for the second district.

The Tractile Value of Machine Guns.

Washington, D. C., April 11.—The military information division has been accumulating much data concerning machine guns, and has prepared a general staff bulletin in the form of a 200-page pamphlet on the subject, dealing with the tactical use of such ordnance. The material consists, for the most part, of translations made by army officers of foreign comment, to which has been added information received from military attaches who accompanied the Russian and Japanese armies in the field. It is interesting to observe that the Russians have lost confidence in the machine gun, probably largely for the reason that they sacrificed eight pieces at Yalu, while the Japanese came into a high appreciation of the weapon for the damage the Russian guns wrought in succeeding engagements, especially at the battle of Nanshan Hill. The results obtained with the machine guns have increased the military favor of that ordnance, both on account of the physical and moral effect in engagements.

Machetes for the Army.

Washington, D. C., April 11.—The machete, which was an implement of the Spanish troops in Cuba and the Philippines, by whom they are to be used in cutting paths through the thick underbrush rather than as weapons. They have become indispensable in that capacity, and it has now been decided, on the recommendation of the general staff of the army, to extend the machete to the field artillery troops at home and add that implement to the individual equipment of the light artillerymen in the field. The machete in such instances will be worn in a sheath or scabbard attached to the belt. The machete is considered of special value to members of the mountain batteries, of which there are several in this country, all of them destined sooner or later for duty in the Philippines.

Salerooms on Vesey street, under orders of Henry and John Gilsey, executors of the estate. The first parcel to be offered for sale will be Proctor's Fifth Avenue theater building, at the northwest corner of Twenty-eighth street and Broadway.

Several real estate experts value the property at about \$2,000,000. In the theater building are stores and offices. The building occupies a plot fronting 105.9 feet on Broadway and 189 feet in Twenty-eighth street. The length of the north line of the plot is 131.2 feet and the west line 98.9 feet. The plot comprises about 17,000 square feet. The lease of the property held by P. F. Proctor is not for a long term, and whoever buys the property will soon be able to tear down the building and erect in its place a modern, tall office building with stores on the ground floor. The west end of the plot will be within a few feet of the Twenty-eighth street station of the Sixth Avenue spur of the old Morton street tunnel.

The Princess Theater, just north of Proctor's Fifth Avenue Theater, is also on a plot owned by the Gilsey estate. Peter Gilsey erected on the site of the present Fifth Avenue theater a building which was opened October 10, 1898, as Apollo Hall, and was variously known as Newcomb's Hall and the St. James Theater, and used for vaudeville and minstrel performances. In 1873 the late St. Augustin Daly became manager of that theater and named the new house the Fifth Avenue. On January 2, 1891, the theater was destroyed by fire. At the time of the fire the attraction was Fanny Davenport's production of Sardou's "Cleopatra." In 1892 the theater was rebuilt and since then it has been enlarged and extensively improved.

Peter Gilsey was one of the many old-time merchants of this city who made large sums of money from real estate ventures. He was born at Hoffs Province of Jutland, Denmark, in 1811, and died in this city on August 8, 1878. He came to this city in 1837, friendless and almost penniless. He secured employment in a piano factory, and saved each week part of his wages, until he was able to engage in business. His first business venture was the purchase of a stock of retail tobacco merchant. With this he opened a small store in the Bowery. Later he moved to Cortlandt street and Broadway. Then he began to invest his money in real estate, and at the time of his death owned a great deal of very valuable property, including the Gilsey House, the Coleman House, the Fifth Avenue theater and an office building at Cortlandt street and Broadway.
