THE USE OF ROAD DRAGS.

In Southern Benton—Immensely Popular, They Say—The Plan.

Farmers in southern Benton think they have struck a good thing in the road drag that was a theme of discussion at the good roads convention held at the Corvallis court house last December. The appliance is made from a trunk of a tree, say eight feet in length. It should be eight inches in diameter, and oak, fir, ash or any other kind may be used. It is split in halves and framed so that the two pieces stand on edge, with the split side to the front. The forward piece is shod with a plate of quarter inch iron so that its edge while in use will not wear away. This simple device dragged occasionally over the road has, they say, remarkable results. It fills the holes and reduces the road to a condition of smoothness that is surprising. It can be so slanted while in operation that it will throw much of the dirt that is loose to the center or to the outside. Those who use it say that for its purpose no road machine does so much with so little effort.

On R. F. D. route No. 4, a dozen of these drags are in use. Farmers along the route have built them, and whenever it seems to be necessary they send out the drag and work the road for an hour or two, with the result that the smoothest highways in the county are said to be in the neighborhood where this practice is followed. Secret in Battleship Building.

Washington, D. C., April 12.—The circular to bidders who may construct the 1906 battleships was sent by the navy department. This circular gives the chief characteristics of the newly designed ships of 16,000 tons displacement, the general description of which has already been published. The most notable departure from the usual design is in the chance given bidders to submit designs for turbine, instead of the ordinary reciprocating engines. The circulars are labelled "confidential," the first adoption of that term by a secretary in connection with such information by the navy department. The policy is somewhat reciprocal, and is evidently borrowed from the British, who have maintained the greatest silence concerning the Dreadnaught.

Practically nothing is known regarding the British 18,000 ton ship except its size and battery, and it is intended that the details concerning the American ships be similarly guarded. Hitherto the circulars have been distributed to whomsoever choose to ask for them. They contain nothing but the general description, and do not embrace the plans, which are always regarded as confidential matter.

There is a difference of opinion among naval officers regarding the wisdom and value of imposing secrecy regarding the circulars. Some of them think it is necessary and ought to be done at all cost; others take the view that nothing is calculated to invite curiosity and create a demand for certain information more than the circumstance of its confidential quality. It is possible that the navy department will relieve the document of its confidential character, but for the present it will be guarded as a government secret and letters have been sent to intending bidders, advising them of that fact.

By No Means a Bargain.

The statement that a copy of Lady Anne Hamilton's "Secret History of the Court of England," published in 1832, is worth £1000, appears to have emanated from a totally unreliable and uninformed source. It will be remembered that a New Oxford street bookseller, C. J. Sawyer, had the ill luck to let a copy stray into the "sixpenny box," where it was picked up by a casual customer or a keen bibliographer, who knew it was worth more than sixpence. Some reports of the loss stat-

ed that £1000 had been offered for a copy of the same work in New York.

The plain facts are (1) that the "Secret History" is catalogued in the second hand lists at between 15s and 35s a copy, the variation being due to condition, and (2) that there are a good many copies extant. There was a sixpenny release of the work by a popular firm some years ago, in which it was usually stated that the sum of £1000 was offered for a copy of the 1832 edition in New York. Why such a fancy price was offered and the circumstances of the offer are not now known. Bibliographers smile at the suggestion that at any period a copy was worth so much.

"The Secret History," said one of the best known book sellers yesterday, "has no historical value and could never obtain a sensational price. Why it is worth so much as a sovereign is that it is packed with scandal, and that appeals to a certain class of book buyers. You have only to put a suggestion of revelations into a title, even to command a fairly good sale, and as the book gets scarcer the price is enhanced."

Another second-hand book seller of repute pointed out that the chance of picking up a small fortune at the second hand shop or stall is about a billion to one. There are really few genuine book lovers, and they get all the second hand lists and know as much as we do.

Yesterday a Daily Chronicle representative saw a copy of the "Secret History" on offer at five shillings, but it was in a bad condition. Mr. Sawyer says that, in consequence of the publicity given to his loss, he has been deluged with over two hundred offers of copies, but that they are mostly of the sixpenny print, which has no special value. He offers £15 for the return of the actual copy sold by his assistant for sixpence, apparently having means of identifying it.—London Chronicle.

Anecdotes of Mark Twain.

At a dinner given by some local mercantile or business organization, Mr. Clemens responded to the toast of "Hartford." In his speech he glorified the city as the one place in the world which provided for every possible human need. He said that Hartford wrote life insurance policies to protect men's lives, accident policies to protect their persons, and fire insurance policies to protect their future. It made guns and pistols with which to kill men, but printed books to tell them how to live and Bible to tell them how to die. In short, it supplied all their needs, not only here, but hereafter.

When Rev. Dr. Smith, president of Trinity college, a warm personal friend, was hesitating as to accepting a call to a western bishopric, Mr. Clemens wrote him a letter of disapproval, closing by suggesting a form of letter to send to the diocese which he would guarantee would prevent his being troubled with future calls of the same nature. The formula was: "Dear brethren of the diocese of —, I have received your call to be your bishop. In reply I would say that I would see you in — first."—Harper's Weekly.
