PLENTY OF FIRE HYDRANTS

The work is just being completed on the putting in of new fire hydrants in the outlying districts of this city. During the latter part of last year the city council ordered 19 new fire hydrants of the Salem Iron Works. These have now been completed, and are considered of the very best and most practically made. They cost the city \$26.50 each and a Journal writer is of the opinion that they are not only cheap at that figure, but that they are as well made as could be turned out in the east or any other place.

The water company is responsible for connecting up these new hydrants and is pushing the work along rapidly. One of these new hydrants is being put in each of the following named street intersections:

Third ward—State and 18th.
Fourth ward—Mill and Summer.
Also two on Mission street, between commercial and the Blind school.
Fifth ward—Cottage and Market.
Sixth ward—State and 24th street; Chemeketa and 18 street; Chemeketa and 20th.
Seventh ward—Miller and Saginaw; Commercial and Myers.
This is one of the first decisive steps in the interest of the new wards, and

will be hailed with great pleasure by residents in these outlying districts.

FRUITLAND FLAG RAISING

LARGE ATTENDANCE OF THE
NEIGHBORHOOD WAS
PRESENT

Fine Programs, Tall Pole
Raised, Flag Presented and
Basket Dinner Served

There was a large gathering of the patriotic and public-spirited people of Fruitland and neighborhood Friday to witness the raising of a fine 75-foot flagstaff, the serving of a fine basket dinner in honor of flag day, a splendid Arbor day program, and a special program by the school in honor of flag day. The exercises and drills by the children were among the best ever presented in the county. Mr. Patton, on behalf of Patton Bros., presented a fine flag, the twenty-third he has raised on school houses in the county.

The teachers of Fruitland school are Mrs. Jacob Mosier and Miss Jennie Burt, the latter being the Capital Journal correspondent, and both ladies are women of great ability in their chosen profession. The school directors are Messrs. McIlwain, Runner and Halston. John Brokaw is the clerk. The school house was beautifully decorated, and the table was served by the young ladies of the neighborhood, there being a large attendance of citizens from all around the country.

Raising the Staff.

It took a heavy team of horses and a large rope and chains and pulleys to raise the staff, but it was accomplished after considerable effort. The men out that way were taxed to their utmost with the tools they had to put up that pole, but Fruitland men never give up, and finally it lifted its tall top in the air, with cheers, and there it will stand for years to come, and the flag will fly whenever the school is in session. The flag was presented to the district in a neatly-worded speech, that was received with applause, and Clerk Brokaw, in an appropriate and patriotic address, accepted Old Glory on behalf of the district. He made the best acceptance speech we have heard so far. Frank Davey delivered an address on education that was well received, and Col. Hofer introduced Comrade Oliver P. Graham, a private in the 14th Wisconsin, who was at the siege of Vicksburg, and was a prisoner in Andersonville. He fought side by side with the Journal editor's father through the War of the Rebellion. The programs for the day were given by the children as follows:

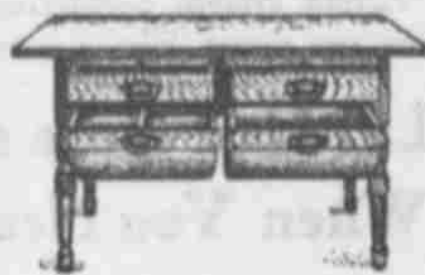


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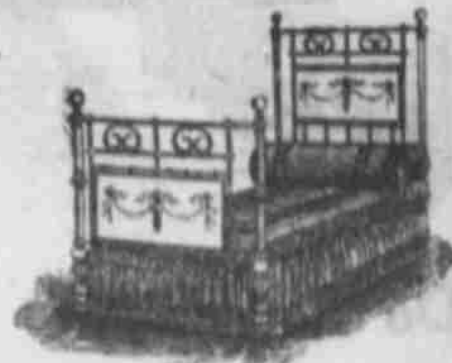
