WILL BE

EVENT

Arrangements are being made to bury the remains of Jason Lee, the pioneer missionary to Oregon of the Methodist Episcopal church, in the Lee Missionary cemetery near this city. The interment will be preceded by a fitting service, in which representatives of the church, pioneers and the state governments of Oregon, Washington and Idaho will participate. The service will be held in connection with the commencement exercises at Willamette University, probably upon June 14, the day before the regular graduation program.

As Appropriate Tribute.

The services in connection with the interment, which will be an appropriate tribute to the life and work of Jason Lee, are being arranged by a committee consisting of President J. H. Coleman of Willamette University; A. M. Smith, of Portland, president of the board of trustees of Willamette; Rev. Walton Skipworth, of The Dalles; Mrs. Smith French, of The Dalles; and F. H. Grubbs, of Portland, a son-in-law of Jason Lee. June 14 has been set as the date for the memorial, but it is possible that it will be changed to a few days earlier, as the Pioneer Association holds a meeting upon that day and it is desired to keep the meetings from conflicting.

Three Meetings Planned.

Three meetings will be held in connection with the service. The morning meeting will be in charge of the Methodist Episcopal church, and Bishop B. H. Moore will preside. In the afternoon the pioneers will pay their tribute, with A. Bush, of Salem, presiding. In the evening Judge P. A. Moore will preside, and the governors of Oregon, Washington and Idaho will be asked to deliver addresses. Among the clergymen who will be requested to take part in the services are: Rev. John Plinn, of Vancouver; Rev. John Atwood, of Seattle; Rev. D. L. Rader, of Portland; Rev. I. D. Driver, of Eugene; Rev. A. J. Joslyn, of Seattle; and Rev. Nelson Clark, of Spokane.

It is especially appropriate that the memorial ceremony should be a part of the commencement exercises of Willamette University, as Jason Lee was the founder of the Oregon Institute, which began its career in 1843, and afterward grew into Willamette University. Representatives of the university, including some of the students, will probably have a part in the program.

Work of Jason Lee.

Jason Lee came to Oregon in 1824, as a missionary to the Indians, and his work here is familiar to every person in touch with the early history of the state. He established his head mis-

sion at Salem, whence branch missions were opened at Oregon City, The Dalles, Clatsop and Puget Sound. The first settlement of the missionaries was on Mission Prairie, south of Salem.

Jason Lee died in 1845, while on a visit to his old home at Stanstead, Canada. His body was interred in the cemetery at that place, but was sent to Portland about one year ago at the request of the Columbia River and Oregon Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal church. It was placed in the vaults in the Chamber of Commerce building and will be left there until the time of the services that will precede its final interment.

As Mr. Parry Sees It.

When we are socialists:
A citizen shall be given a state number instead of a name.

He shall receive from the state kitchen three-quarters of a pound of food per day.

No citizen shall weigh over 110 pounds, or exceed five feet in height.
Male and female citizens shall wear as raiment the common scarlet garment provided by the state.

Each citizen shall laugh aloud once every half hour.

All food eaten by citizens in the public dining rooms shall be chewed nine times on the right side of the jaw and nine times on the left, that perfect equality in mastication shall be preserved.

The finger nails of citizens shall be cut a uniform length.

All children of citizens shall be placed in the state public nurseries until the age of 7 years.

All children of 7 years shall be placed in the disciplinary asylums, and taught the state code of rules, until the age of 14.

All citizens over the age of 14 shall be placed in the state public dormitories, and made to contribute their share of labor in state factories.

A citizen shall be officially notified by an inspector of marriage when the state has appointed either a husband or wife.

Notification must be made four days before marriage.

State inspectors must be present at the first meeting of contracting parties and see that the law is obeyed.

One kiss shall be exchanged by contracting parties.

At the end of three years the state will grant a divorce at the request of either one or both parties, and new persons shall be appointed in marriage to each one.

Peace at Easter Festival.

St. Petersburg, April 16.—The Easter festival, the anniversary of the Jewish massacres at Kishineff and other places happily was not stained this year, so far as was reported up to midnight, by anti-Jewish excesses. The measures taken by the central government and the orders sent to the provincial authorities to take every precaution, with the added warning that they would be held personally responsible for outbreaks, apparently were effective, though the danger will not be over until the Easter holidays are passed.

The high church feast was celebrated in the usual fashion—with much eating and drinking and the exchange of the kiss of peace. Some slackening in the old religious fervor was noticeable, especially in St. Petersburg. This is attributed to the revolutionary propaganda, which, in striking at the roots of the state, touched also the blind devotion to the church.

The streets of the capital have been alive since early morning with the cabs of government officials and clerks, making their congratulatory calls on their superiors. Minister of the Interior Durnovo, however, published a notice to his subordinates stating that it was not necessary for them to call on him, and in the midst of general surprise his retirement from office was announced, but this declaration of congratulations is regarded as another intimation that his relinquishment of office is a matter of a few days.

Count Witte for the moment seems to have downed his rival, the elections having strengthened his position great-

ly and enabled him to lay the blame for representations to M. Durnovo.

Among the further Easter honors announced today are the following: The order of Vladimir of the first class is bestowed upon Nicholas de Lodyginsky, consul general at New York; the order of Stanislaus of the second class upon Kozakavitch, consul at San Francisco; the order of Vladimir of the third class upon M. Wolfant, charge d'affaires in Mexico, whose wife is an American woman.

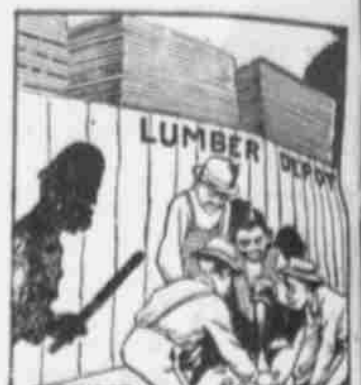
