A CITY OF STEEL WORKERS

Word has been received by the Indiana state authorities from Washington that the government will lend every material aid to the plans of the United States Steel corporation to establish a mammoth plant in Lake county at a site near Indiana Harbor, and which is to be known as Gary. The information received here is to the effect that Secretary Taft, who has authority to fix deep harbor lines in the absence of action by congress, will do so unless this congress makes the necessary provision for the work. E. H. Gary, chairman of the executive committee of the United States Steel corporation, it is said, was in consultation with Congressman Chumpacker for several days this week, and the assurance given by him and received from Secretary Taft, leave no doubt that the work on the big plan will be begun at once and pushed rapidly to completion.

The steel corporation has not asked any aid from the government, nor any bonuses from the people of Lake county, but it has purchased hundreds of acres of land at enormous prices and propose to expend \$14,000,000 on its new plant. One of the first steps will be to erect a large number of cottages for the men who will be engaged in construction, and these will afterward be occupied by the men who will find permanent employment in the big mills. It is the intention to incorporate in this state, and this branch of the corporation will be known as the Indiana Steel company. The immense purchases of land and the large scale on which the plant is projected are the forerunners of a gradual concentration of the energies of the corporation in Indiana, for it is understood that a number of small plants throughout the country are to be abandoned, the employees moved to Gary and the capacity of the plant increased till it will be the largest of its kind in the world.

The coming of the gigantic corporation with its millions of money to invest has worked a great change in Lake county. It has proved as good as an oil buck to the land owners, with the added prospect of being very much more permanent. Ten years ago the lands in and around the site of the proposed mills could have been bought for a song, and it was rare to find a piece of land that was assessed for taxation at more than \$20 or \$25 an acre. The first purchases by the corporation were at figures close around the \$100 mark. Then land began to soar and many farms were sold at \$200 and \$250 an acre, while in some instances as much as \$350 an acre was paid for land that was absolutely necessary to round out the tract which the corporation desired. The negotiations for this land began less than six months ago, and men who were poor and always expected to be poor if they depended upon the land and themselves with small fortunes in hand and free from debt.

Of course, the object of the United States Steel corporation is to lessen the cost of production of the manufactured product. Much of the raw material which it uses comes from the northwest, and the long railroad haul to its plants is no inconsiderable part of the whole cost. It owns large ore deposits in Michigan and Wisconsin, and if it can get this ore to its plant by water in its own ships, and thus escape the railroad charges, there would be a very material difference in cost. Mr. Gary, who appears to have the preliminaries in charge, has represented to Congressman Chumpacker that nothing less than a deep sea harbor would meet the demands of the company, and it is assumed from this that the largest possible ships are to be employed in transporting the ore from the northwestern mines to the new plant.

The site of the new industry and town of Gary, by which it will be surrounded, is only seven miles east of the Illinois-Indiana line, and but nine miles from South Chicago. The plant will employ more than 10,000 men when it is first opened, and it is expected that a city of 20,000 people will be added to Indiana in two years.—New York Sun.

WILL NOT TAKE THE MEDICINE

W. D. Wheelwright Talks for the Coolie, But It Don't Sound Good

W. D. Wheelwright, president of the Pacific Export Lumber company, represented the Portland chamber of commerce at the reception tendered the Chinese commission, which arrived in the United States via Seattle, early in the month. The following is an extract from Mr. Wheelwright's address on that occasion:

"The great President of the United States has extended his protecting hand and given orders that all Chinese seeking admission to our land shall be treated humanely and that our laws with regard to them shall be liberally interpreted. Not only that, but new and modifying legislation is planned; a proposed law, prepared by the American Asiatic company, in consultation with the Chinese minister at Washington and his counsel, the Hon. John W. Foster, and satisfactory to them, was introduced into the United States house of representatives on the 24th of January last, and is now in the hands of the foreign relations committee of that body—and act which would entirely remove the evils complained of.

"It does not provide for the admission of any Chinese laborers (except those who have resided here and wish to return), but it allows the free transit of those who are here on the mainland of the United States and from one to another island of any group belonging to this country; it grants to all Chinese persons, whether laborers or others, the privilege of traveling freely across the territory of the United States; it guarantees to any Chinese laborer charged with being unlawfully in the United States territory a hearing before a judge, justice or commissioner of the United States court; it defines the word 'laborers' as meaning manual laborers; and it grants to all other classes of persons the privilege of entrance into and residence in the United States, on the production of a passport or certificate issued by the officer duly authorized therefor by the government of China, and certified to by the consul of the United States at the port of departure; it guarantees to all Chinese the right of habeas corpus. This act promises to relieve all privileged classes of the unjust and unreasonable restrictions that have so long encompassed them and have prevented them coming to this country. It has the approval of the President as well as of the Chinese minister, and I have every reason to believe that it will in due time become a law.

"While I have long been and am still in favor of the admission into this country under proper restrictions a moderate number of Chinese laborers, so limited as not to threaten the interests of our own people, believing that such a policy would redound to the benefit of all classes in the country, including our laborers themselves, by giving them opportunity to rise above their present conditions, I believe it to be the duty of all citizens to support the present bill. It is a long step in the right direction and will do away with the abuses that have to a great extent alienated the Chinese, and we may safely leave the issue to the sober sense of the country, which is by degrees being disimposed of its prejudices, one of the most conspicuous evidences of which is the cordial and kindly feeling manifested here toward this embassy from our friends across the sea."—The Timberman.
