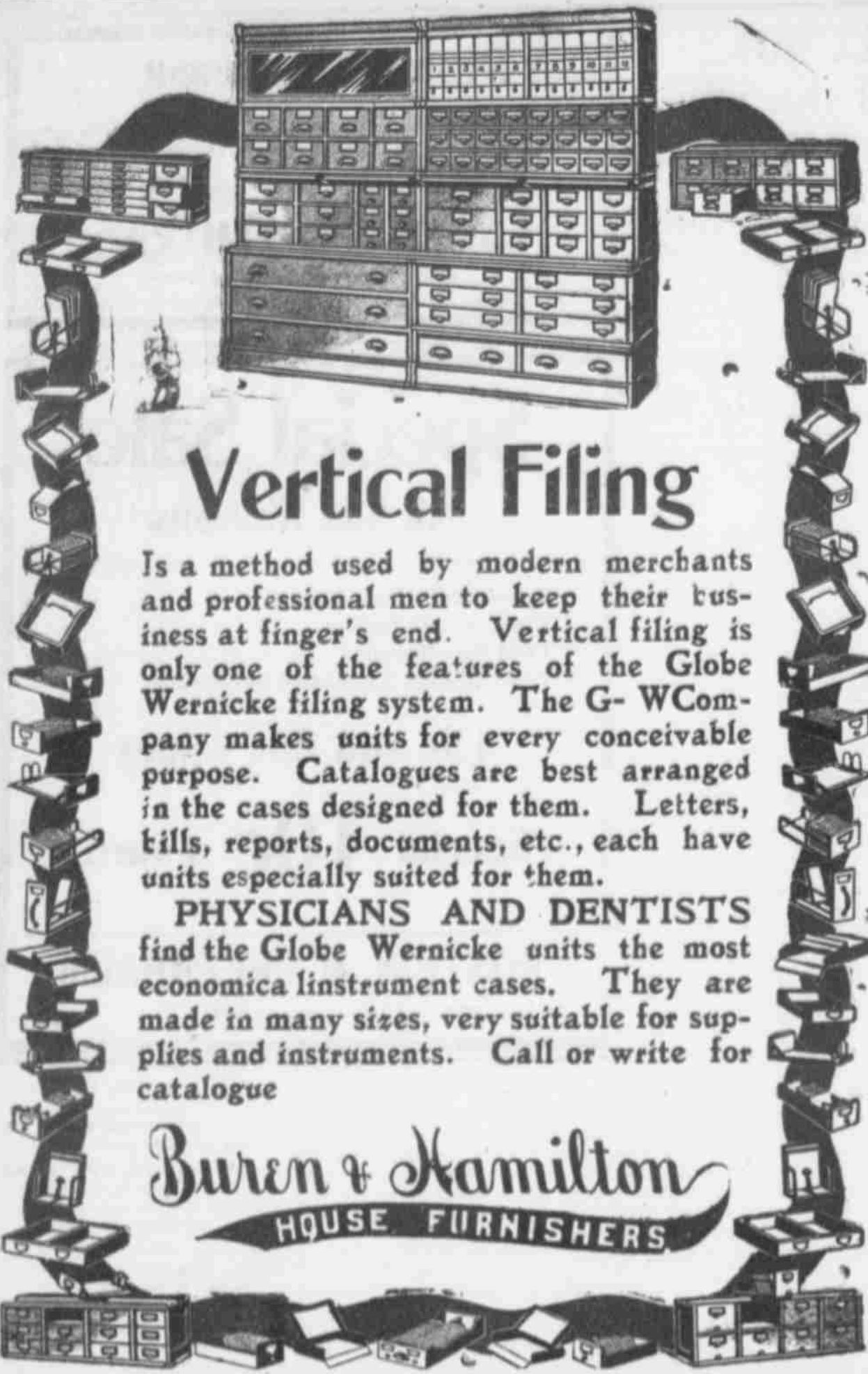

PROBATE COURT MATTERS

In the matter of the estate of H. A. Thomas, Mrs. Jennie M. Thomas and George W. Watt are named as executors, to serve without bonds. The heirs are Jennie M. Thomas, Salem; Albert L. Thomas, Newport, and Ethel L. Thomas, Salem. The will was dated January 4, 1905, and Mrs. Thomas is to hold the property in trust during her lifetime, after which it shall be divided among the heirs. The value of the estate is \$7000.

In the matter of the estate of Ethel Cusick-Morse, deceased, Dr. W. B. Morse was appointed administrator, he being the only legal heir, and his bond was fixed at \$4000. The estate consists of personal property located in Marion and Columbia counties, valued at \$3200. The appraisers of the property situated in this county are C. H. Robertson, F. K. Lovell and P. H. Sreat.

Emily McCown, administrator of the estate of Charles W. McCown, gave \$2500 bonds for performance of duty. Her bondsmen are J. J. Doty and L. H. Manning.

date upon which to hear objections to the sale of property in South Salem to pay claims against the estate of the late Valentine Denver. Cassimere Lawrence was relieved of his trust as administrator of the estate.

GHASTLY SCENES AT LYNCHING

Three Negroes Hanged by a Mob in Missouri Sunday

Springfield, Mo., April 15.—At 2:15 o'clock this morning, William Allen, a young negro, was taken from the county jail here and lynched in the public square by the same mob that two hours earlier had hanged Horace Duncan and James Copeland. The body of Allen later was burned to ashes, as had been those of the other negroes, beneath the spot where they had been lynched.

Following the dispatch of Duncan and Copeland, some one suggested that Allen and Bus Cain, two other negroes known to be in the jail, should also be lynched. The mob, now bloodthirsty and wrought up to the highest pitch of excitement, readily took up the cry, and soon the charred body of a third victim lay beneath the statue of the Goddess of Liberty. Cain escaped.

Allen and Cain were being held upon suspicion of having murdered O. P. Ruark, while Duncan and Copeland were accused of assaulting Mabel Edmondson, a white domestic.

Militia Patrols Streets

Their work finally accomplished, the mob quietly dispersed. But to-day crowds filled the streets, making threats of further vengeance, and tonight several companies of state militia, ordered out by Governor Folk, together with 200 deputy sheriffs, patrol the streets.

When the mob left the jail at midnight with Copeland and Duncan, 14 prisoners escaped in the excitement. Among them was Cain. But Allen was there yet, and the mob found him hidden under a cot. He was dragged out, his hands were tied behind his back, a rope was put around his neck and he was marched down the street to the tower in the square. Two men climbed up the iron stairway and stood upon the platform, with Allen between them.

One of these men, who held a lantern in his hand, faced the crowd below, and, waving his hand toward the negro, said:

"Ladies and gentlemen: This is Will Allen, the man who murdered old man Ruark. What will we do with him?"

"Hang him!" cried the crowd. "Throw him overboard!"

"Can anyone identify this nigger?" asked the spokesman.

"Hold up the lantern," some one shouted. The man put the lantern up so it shone into the face of the negro, and some one in the crowd said:

"Yes, I identify him, Hang him." At this the crowd laughed.

"Are you Will Allen?" asked the orator.

"Yes, but I did not kill Ruark," he answered.

"Well, who did?"

"I only know what I heard—that Bus Cain killed him," the negro answered.

Mob Is Not Decided

The man with the lantern shouted again: "Is this nigger guilty? Yes or no?" Some one shouted "Yes." Others cried "No."

The mob was undecided. While the crowd was debating the second man on the platform began tying a rope to the iron railing. The negro stood directly above the smoldering ash heap, from which the smell of burning flesh arose. But he stood erect while the man with the lantern harangued the mob and they jeered at the negro. In the meantime the rope had been placed about Allen's neck, and presently the hangman caught the negro's ankles, lifted him and threw him forward over the railing.

Allen turned a somersault in the air, and the rope came taut his neck cracked like a pistol shot. The rope broke and he fell in the bed of coals on top of the other two negroes. There he kicked and floundered around until another rope was brought, thrice looped round the neck, and he was again suspended in midair.

More boxes were brought, another big fire was kindled, and soon the swaying figure, now dead, fell into it, sending up an arrowy spray of live sparks. After that most of the men went home, but some men and boys stayed by the tower all night and fed the fire. When daylight broke upon the scene there remained only the blackened trunks and charred remains of the three negroes.

Dancers See Horrible Sight

Five thousands persons saw the trio hanged and burned. Among the crowd of spectators were hundreds of women and children, girls and boys. In a hall overlooking the plaza an Easter dance was in progress. Its music stopped while the dancers crowded to the windows and watched the writhing black bodies and the flames that finally consumed them.

Today souvenirs of the occasion, consisting of a button from the trousers of one of the negroes, a piece of the

hangman's rope, and other pieces of relics, were eagerly bought by many among the crowds that gathered at the scene.

Two Declared Innocent

The authorities tonight assert that two of the victims, Copeland and Duncan, were innocent. This is the general belief. Miss Edmondson, the attack upon whom provoked the lynching outbreaks, when told of the want of vengeance, said: "Served them right." Her condition is pronounced serious.

The greater part of the negro population has been in hiding all day. In the negro quarters many women and children took refuge in cellars and barrels. Whole families fled to the country.

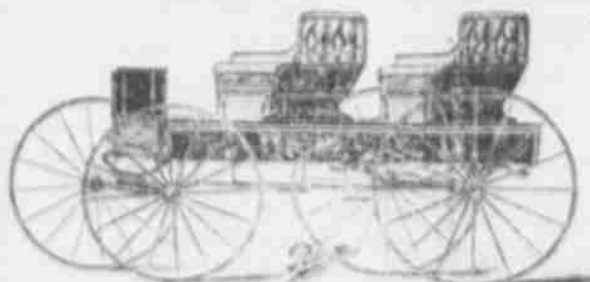
Edison to Reopen
