HOUSE CLEANING BY JEROME

New York, April 7.—The public have been very much interested in the treatment of Mr. Jerome of the insurance men whom the howling dervishes of the press have been demanding be sent to prison or set to work on Blackwell's Island. Equality before the law is what they are all shouting, but how can there be equality before the law? To catch a tramp, and convict him of theft, and send him to prison, inflicts but little punishment upon him. He finds delight in it in some respects, for he has, now that he is in quod, a roof over his head, with good food, and he is safe from all alarms, for the walls of stone are thick and strong. He is not kept awake by pangs of conscience nor does he worry about what the public think about him. Indeed, he knows that the public isn't giving him a thought—he's too obscure. But take the rich man. On the merest suspicion of wrong doing, which may never be established, he becomes a flaring picture before the public at once, and continues such for months and months while the newspapers are trying him and convicting him to their own satisfaction. health ruined, we must suppose that these men are in hell from the very first moment they are accused, and continue in the inferno until they die. If the law clears them their reputations are blackened anyway. If convicted and sent to prison, what to the tramp is a luxury, is to them excruciating torture. The point that Mr. Jerome seeks to impress upon the court and the public is that it is a much more serious matter to accuse a man of standing and prominence than it is an ordinary knave. And in the matter of calling any paying of political contributions larceny, Mr. Jerome evidently thinks it is absurd to thus designate what has been done for years without question by men of character without any thought of offence. It looks too much like blackening people's reputation on technicalities. Nobody can think for a moment that George T. Perkins thought he was committing larceny when he handed over money of the New York Life Insurance company to a representative of a political party.

A contrasting picture was presented in court at the very moment that Mr. Perkins was arrested. A boy of 13 was sent to a correctional institution for three years for stealing a cent. But the stealing of that cent showed that the boy possessed the very quintessence of the spirit of theft; that he almost strangled a little girl to get the penny away from her because he wanted to steal it. He was truly a thief, thoroughly impregnated with dishonesty, and when he was being taken away for punishment he turned and laughed. Theft is theft. Is there any relationship between that boy's forcible taking of that penny and Perkins's bestowal of a contribution on a political party?

The hotel men are praying for some escape for their hostilities from the suicide nuisance. The landlord hires out his rooms to those that come, and when a suicide comes and delivers his corpse, giving the room a gruesome appearance and scaring the servant girls, the landlord wants to know of himself why he has been distinguished from his fellows for such an inflection upon ordinary rights. out of port filled with Americans seeking pleasure resorts abroad. Steamer after steamer, larger and faster than their predecessors, have been added to the lines, but the passenger lists are always full, and the staterooms are scarcely ever empty. Eleven thousand emigrants landed in New York in one day last week. They came over sea, breaking all home ties, and came here to start new homes. But the tourists start homes nowhere; they go over the sea just to stare at other people or landscapes, or buildings. They feel no interest in the lands they visit, and none in the land they leave.

The theater managers have picked up their ears at the tidings of Mrs. Sarah Bernhardt's experience with the tents have come to town. Instead of being driven out of business by the trust's churlish act in refusing her any theater in the south, she's right in it, so to speak, having done the largest business of her career, and way down in what are considered poor places for big houses in theatrical circles. She has made a discovery, not only for herself, but for all the profession. That discovery is, that to have a house that a house cannot hold, an audience has to secure a tent; that a good performance can be given in a tent, and to an audience that couldn't get within sight of a theater door; that the drawing power of a tent is far superior to that of a theater, and that a tent can draw an audience that couldn't possibly be accommodated within walls. These are important discoveries to have made for the theatrical profession. A trust cannot possibly pre-empt all the desirable stands for a tent, and if the play doesn't draw in one locality it can easily be shifted to another place where theaters are more plentiful and better patronage awaits the performance. The troupe is more independent and there is a spice of romance, which, added to the romance in the play, brings the ideal part up to a high level. The enormous sum taken in by Mrs. Bernhardt awakens the envy of all actors, but none of them wish to deny it to her, as they see that she has benefited the profession in its entirety. The religious people have invaded the city with meetings held in tents, and now we may expect to have the theater people do the same. Even the trust may be brought to it.
