ABOUT SAMPLE BALLOTS

The announcement appeared on the first page of The Journal last evening which was, unfortunately, overlooked by the editor. The statement therein contained, that sample ballots were being illegally distributed, in the interest of certain parties, is an error on the face of it, for the law contemplates that such sample ballot shall be given out.

Section 24, on page 43 of the election laws makes provision for this, as follows:

"These colored sample ballots shall be furnished as soon as printed, at any time before the primary nominating election, by the respective county or city clerks, in reasonable quantities, to all electors applying for the same; and on the day of said election, under the direction and control of the judges at each polling place, said colored sample ballots shall be given in proper quantities to all electors applying for them."

N. Y. C. Stockholders' Meeting.

Albany, N. Y., April 18.—The stockholders of the New York Central railroad company have been called to meet here this afternoon to vote on the increase of the capital stock of the company from \$150,000,000 to \$250,000,000, as authorized and approved by the board of directors. There is little doubt that the increase will be voted. The proposed increase is designed "to provide additional capital for such corporate purposes of the company as the board of directors may determine any may be issued when the directors deem it advisable." The issue will comprise 1,000,000 shares at \$100 each. It is announced that this action is taken pursuant of a resolution adopted by the board of directors of their meeting in February.

When the entire issue to be made at once, the stock market would, undoubtedly, be seriously embarrassed, but the statement has been made that the new stock will be issued from time to time in installments as the company's requirements may dictate. The entire amount is to be used for improvements. These improvements include the entire reconstruction of the Grand Central Station, the electrification of the road as far north of Croton-on-the-Hudson, and the building of several additional tracks to that point. It also includes the electrification of the West Shore railroad, part of which is under way. It is not stated if the proceeds of the new stock will be used to pay for the new trolley lines that have recently been acquired by the company.

GEER IN BAKER COUNTY

Ex-Governor T. T. Geer arrived in Baker last night, and is spending the day with old-time friends in the interest of his candidacy for the Republican nomination for governor. He has spent the last week in Gilliam, Umatilla and Union counties, and is assured of a strong support there, as well as in Eastern Oregon generally. The ex-governor was for eleven years a resident of Union county, and since his removal to the Willamette valley has, by his frequent campaigns, and otherwise kept in close touch with Eastern Oregon's interests.

Governor Geer has campaigned in every county in Oregon, but one, an experience which no other man has had, the result being that he has loyal friends in every precinct in every county working in his behalf and promising an easy victory at the primaries. If nominated, Mr. Geer has announced his intention to challenge Governor Chamberlain to a joint stump-speaking campaign covering the entire state. He goes tonight to Heppner.—Baker City Herald.

Boston, Mass., April 18.—Under the auspices of the Boston Federation of Jewish Organizations, a patriotic celebration in commemoration of the anniversary of the Kishineff massacre will be held at Tremont Temple this evening. There will be an interesting and elaborate program, including music by the Beethoven orchestra, singing by Cantor Wolkowitch, of the Temple Ohabei Shalom, and organ selections by Mrs. Wilkinson.

Addresses will be delivered by Governor Guild, Mayor Fitzgerald, Rabbi Fleischer, ex-Attorney General Parker, President G. Stanley Hall of Clark university, Rabbi Eichler, David Blaustein superintendent of the Educational Alliance of New York city, and the Hon. Carroll D. Wright. Jacob T. Silverman will preside. The discussion will be on various important questions concerning the welfare of the Hebrews in the United States and the condition of their unfortunate brethren in Russia.

New Hampshire G. A. R. Encampment.

Concord, N. H., April 18.—The annual encampment of the G. A. R. of New Hampshire opened here at 1:30 this afternoon at the State House with a large attendance. The department commander and the department officers submitted their reports in the afternoon session, and this evening there will be a big camp fire at White's Opera House, which will also be attended by the delegates and members of the Women's Relief Corps, the Sons and Daughters of Veterans and other auxiliary organizations, meeting here at the same time as the G. A. R.

Assembly Ball at Astor House.

New York, April 18.—The Assembly Ball, which will be given at the old Astor House on lower Broadway this evening, promises to be one of the most interesting and brilliant social events of the season. On that occasion memories of the olden times, when the old Astor House was the center of New York's social and political life, will be revived. Once more, as 60 years ago, society, dressed in silks and satins, cut after the style of those days, will meet in the large ball room of the old hotel. Crinolines, powdered hair and patches will be worn by the ladies and gay colors will run riot in the ball room, when the opening bars of the polonaise will invite fair dames and gallant gentlemen to dance.

Sixty years ago the Astor House was the center of New York life. There statesmen, politicians, social leaders, writers, and heads of business interests gathered, and to be a guest there, at \$1.75 a day, meals included, meant an entrance to society. Many famous dinners, receptions and balls were given at the Astor House between 1840 and 1890, and it is to revive interest in this period of New York history and in old New York generally, that the ball is to be held. Everything reminiscent of the 40's, which might properly adorn a ball room, has been gathered for the occasion. Old portraits have been hung on the walls and trimmed with garlands; old fashioned curtains
