Anti-American Move by the Kaiser.

Washington, April 7.—Disappointed in his hope of gaining a naval base in Morocco, the German emperor is planning to make his next spectacular demonstration across the Atlantic in Santo Domingo. This is the expressed view of a high Washington official.

The state department has not yet recovered from its surprise at Baron Rosen's sudden announcement of Russia's purpose to set the date of The Hague conference for early in July instead of late in the Autumn, as originally planned. The new date would conflict with the date set for the Pan-American congress at Rio Janeiro, July 21. This congress was to be assembled for the purpose, among other things, of submitting certain questions to The Hague.

Russia's move is ascribed to manipulation by Germany. The Kaiser would evade discussion or recognition by the Hague of the doctrine of caveat emptor for South America, forbidding thereafter the forcible collection of debts by foreign nations, which Secretary Root hoped formally to present to the Hague conference as the sense of the congress of the all Americans.

The "developed" Calvo or Drago doctrine, so-called, has been approved by the administration as the means of finally settling with such foreign complications as are now troubling Santo Domingo. It is believed that Emperor William, by his influence with German bankers and his present official disapproval of the advancing of money by them for the flotation of Russia's immense loans, seeks to bend Russian diplomacy to the accomplishment of his design of staying off, if possible, discussion at the Hague of the question of customs seizures on this side of the Atlantic. Should the senate reject the Santo Domingo treaty, says the high authority mentioned, we may expect the next outbreak from the Kaiser in the western hemisphere.

Casablanca, Emperor William's objective in Morocco, would have furnished a naval station a good way on the route from Germany to the West Indies. If by force, intimidation and chicanery the Kaiser might succeed in establishing a second naval base in Santo Domingo, German fleets would command Panama, and ultimately the Pacific, would protect German colonial expansion, and would dictate the destinies of South America. Acting ostensibly on behalf of the various groups of foreign creditors, Germany might take advantage of Santo Domingo's chaotic internal state, give the insurgents control of the government, and take a town as the price of intervention.

Polled of Casablanca, the emperor's impulse, it is said, is to leap the Atlantic at a bound. Of course he would not expect to set a naval base so close to our shores without inviting war with the United States. Nevertheless, it is asserted, this is the problem with which our government may soon be confronted.

Secretary Root is resolved not to consent to the assembling of the Hague conference earlier than October, the time of his return from Rio. It is announced today that the state department has suggested to the Russian government through Ambassador Rosen that the period suggested in the Russian note for the meeting of the conference would be inconvenient to the United States and to some of the other countries of this hemisphere which had expected to be represented at the Hague.

The state department has not yet suggested another date for the Hague conference, but it is probable that this will follow later, after other powers invited to the conference have had an opportunity to express their desires as to the program and the date, for in this matter all stand on an equal footing.

UNDER MANHATTAN ISLAND

In an address one of the city officers intimated that an extraordinary outpouring of water, a great gushing of a living stream from the rock beneath the hotel at Forty-second street and Fourth avenue, was to be explained by a break in the aqueduct. That would be curious hydrostatics by which an aqueduct main could be so broken as to leak downward through solid rock and then force its way upward gushing with impetuosity and in amount sufficient to supply the needs of this great hotel.

An adjoining building at the time of its erection was to be equipped with an artesian well if water could be found. The drillers bored through the rock of like character with that beneath the hotel just alluded to, penetrating as far as 700 feet. There the drill brought up primeval rock of great density and of such character that it seemed as though it were the substance upon which the whole superstructure of the globe is resting. But no water came and, the well project was abandoned.

So, too, Amos E. Eno experiments when he was building the Fifth Avenue hotel. The drillers of that day, nearly fifty years ago, carried their drills far toward the interior, discovering only increased density and dryness. But forty years later, when the Flatiron building was under construction, the drillers accidentally reached a spring perennial and of unfiltered water of which avail was made, and yet that building is diagonally across the street from the hotel Mr. Eno built.

Geology has shown some queer structures of utmost interest to the student as well as to the builder upon Manhattan island. Columbia university recently received a gift for the endowment of an additional school of mines, and, as the foundation was excavated, there were discovered traces of copper and even of iron, so that it was agreed that the students would have practical opportunity for learning the science and art of mining on

gingering, even though the deposit of these metals was not great enough to bring commercial success.

When the Title company, which is now erecting a building on Broadway, between Cortlandt and John streets, was excavating, there came up with fragments of rock certain ore which looked suspiciously precious. It was assayed and found to be gold itself. When Mr. Olmsted's engineers were at work leveling the rocks or protecting the hillocks of what is now Central park, considerable, although minute, specimens of gold and some silver, were disclosed. Copper was found in the northern part of Manhattan island.

So, too, the underlying springs are almost innumerable, and builders have often found difficulty in suppressing them. Frederick K. Vanderbilt's house on Fifth avenue is built over a spring which is the source of a subterranean stream, and spring and stream could not be conquered and were, therefore, only covered.

No such gushing in great supply and energy of water has been of late reported as was that discovered under the Hotel Belmont a few days ago. It is not yet known whether this is superficial and may soon be exhausted, or whether Mr. Belmont's company has been fortunate enough to secure a permanent and pure water supply, so that the hotel may have three characteristics, one, that it is the loftiest in the city; second, that it is to be decorated by Mrs. Whitney, who was one of the daughters of Cornelius Vanderbilt, and, third, that it has obtained without expense a supply of water of natural artesian production.—New York Letter in Philadelphia Press.
