Marathon Run to Boston.

Ashland, Mass., April 19.—A large crowd was assembled near the bridge about one mile beyond the depot of Ashland, when the great Marathon race, under the auspices of the Boston athletic association started there at noon today. At the crack of the pistol in the hands of the starter the runners started down toward the depot, each accompanied by a bicycle rider, who has orders to assist the runner to whom he is assigned in every possible way, should he become disabled or be compelled for some reason or other to drop out of the race. Every man whose strength should give out, will be put aboard of a train or trolley car and sent home under escort of his cyclist companion.

The course of the race, which is about 25 miles long, runs from the starting point toward the depot, across the tracks of the railroad, and in an almost straight line through South Framingham, Natick, Wellesley, Newton Lower Falls, past the large sign boards through the Newtons, Chestnut Hill, past the reservoir, through Beacon street, into Exeter street, and finishing at the Boston athletic club house.

The runners, more than 50 of whom started this noon, all seemed to be in good physical condition, but it is expected that a great many of them will drop out before having covered the entire distance. Prizes will be given to the first eight men, and a souvenir each to the following 25 men who may finish after the prize winners. Souvenirs will also be presented to each caretaker of all contestants being placed.

Anniversary of Baltimore Anniversary.

Baltimore, Md., April 19.—Today is a memorable day in the history of this country. Just 131 years ago the shot was fired at Lexington which "was heard around the world," and just 45 years ago today Baltimore was the scene of an important event in the history of the United States, the attack upon the Sixth Massachusetts regiment, as it was on its way to Washington in defense of the Union. There are still quite a number of persons living in this city who remember that April 9th, nearly half a century ago.

The country was in a turmoil then. Fort Sumpter had been fired upon, the federal government had been called upon to put down the rebellion, and the stars and bars had been run up to replace the Stars and Stripes in many of the Southern states. Baltimore was a hotbed of secessionists then, and when the Washington authorities attempted to pass armed men through the city there was trouble.

On the morning of April 9th, the Sixth Massachusetts regiment and portions of the First and Second regiments of Pennsylvania troops started across the city. They were greeted by hoots and jeers, and showers of missiles were hurled at them by the immense throng of Southern sympathizers. A soldier's gun was accidentally discharged, the mob made an assault, and the soldiers fired a volley. Four soldiers and 12 citizens were killed, and 36 soldiers and a great many citizens injured.

Celebrating Patriots' Day.

Boston, Mass., April 19.—The anniversary of the Battle of Lexington, being a legal holiday in the state of Massachusetts under the name of Patriots' Day, was duly observed here and in other cities and towns throughout the state in the usual manner. Many patriotic and social organizations will hold meetings this afternoon and evening, when important speakers will deliver addresses on the meaning and importance of the day.

In the town of Lexington the day was ushered in, as customary, by the Lexington drum corps and the School Color guards. There was also a band concert on the battle green in the forenoon. There will be another band concert in the afternoon and later in the afternoon there will be a popular entertainment for young people. The Old Belfry club will keep open house all day and will conduct the usual ball in the evening. The Irish-American historical society will hold its annual meeting in the afternoon and a banquet in the evening.

At Arlington the Fife and Drum corps started early this morning and went over the Paul Revere route, starting at 5 o'clock in the morning from old Mystic bridge, that divides the town from Medford, and marching up the Paul Revere road to Lexington line. The corps visited the revolutionary monument and the Revolutionary bury-

ing ground in the town and decorated them with flowers and flags. The tablets about the town and the Soldiers' monument were also decorated.

THIEVES OUTRUN BY DETECTIVES

Two Noted Pickpockets Caught After Sensational Chase—Woman Is Badly Hurt

New York, April 20.—Near the Grand Central station last Monday three central office detectives, after a sensational chase, arrested John Orr, of Baltimore, who looks like a prosperous business man, and "Red" Murray of San Francisco, whose nickname comes from his flaming red hair and whiskers. Both are professional pickpockets.

With a third thief, who escaped, they tried to steal a pocket book from a passenger, who reported the matter to the detectives. Three officers started in pursuit of the thieves.

Murray, in his flight, knocked down a woman who was carrying a satchel, injuring her so severely that she was unconscious for some time. There was much excitement and confusion before the arrests were made.

When arraigned in court Murray said this was the seventeenth time he has been arrested here since January 17. The prisoners were released on promising to leave the city.

New Rifles for the Army.

Washington, D. C., April 20.—The war department has about completed the new issue of rifles to the troops in the United States. This marks the passing of the carbine, so long a weapon of the cavalry branch of the service. Both infantry and cavalry are now being supplied with the same model

of rifle, a modification of the model of 1903. This is about six inches shorter than the Krag and about two inches longer than the carbine now being discarded by the cavalry. For the present the rifles are being used with the rod bayonet, but later this will be replaced with the new bayonet, recently decided on. The issue to the troops in the Philippines will follow, and when that has been done, all the soldiers of the United States army will be armed alike.
