CITIES GATHER PARKS

"The improvements that are under
way in the South Park district, in
Chicago, are vast in their scope. With-
in the last three years they have spent
\$6,500,000 in providing and equipping
from ten to sixty acres in area. Each
is equipped with buildings and indoor
gymnasiums with physical culture in-
structors and lecture rooms. Chicago,
or rather Cook county, is preparing
to acquire 47,000 acres as a forest re-
serve a few miles north and southwest
of the city limits. This reserve is to
be maintained in its natural condi-
tion as a woodland park.

"New York, of course, has the great-
est park system, both in the amount
of money expended and in natural
beauties. They are adding to their
holdings in the Bronx and along the
Hudson river. Baltimore spends a mil-
lion dollars annually on its parks. One-
half of this sum is derived each year
from the street railway company. The
corporation, under the terms of its
franchise, pays that much directly into
the park fund. The rest is secured by
a tax levy. Baltimore is improving its
parks and trying to make a few boule-
vard connections.

"In Philadelphia the Fairmount park
holdings are being increased. This
park, which was originally 1400 acres
in area, little larger than Swincoe park,
now covers 4000 acres. In Washington
the largest improvement they are con-
templating is to change the Mall. It is
1300 feet wide and extends from the
capitol to the Potomac. It is planned
to group public buildings along each
side and reserve the center space for a
parkway with a double roadway and
plaza. Buffalo's park system is in
about the same state of completion as
ours, and its park income is about
the same. Scarcely any boulevards
have been started. In Cleveland not
much has been accomplished. Some
park reservations are in course of
construction, but are not nearly so far
advanced as ours. Of boulevards they
have none. In St. Louis about all they
are doing is to restore Forest park,
which the World's Fair marred. They
have no boulevards to speak of."

Speck von Sternberg, the German am-
bassador to the United States, now on
a visit to this city, will be the prin-
cipal speaker at the annual banquet
of the Pittsburg Traffic Club this
evening. Baron von Sternberg arrived
here yesterday and was received with

due honors as the guest of the Traffic
Club. He was shown the sights of
Pittsburg and vicinity today and will
take another round trip tomorrow, as
the guest of General Manager McRea,
of the Pennsylvania lines. Tomorrow
evening the ambassador will be the
guest of Representative Burks at a
theater party. The banquet this even-
ing will be at the Hotel Schenley, and
covers will be laid for 50 guests.

TYPHOID GERMS IN RIVER.

Three Snow Dwellers Taken Ill and Re-
moved to the Hospital.

As a direct result of drinking river
water and living in snows and trails
along the banks of the river below this
city, an epidemic of typhoid fever has
broken out in two families in the
region of Gold's Lake, north of the Law-
ls and Clark fair grounds. Three per-
sons are under treatment at St. Vin-
cent's hospital. The situation and cir-
cumstances have been reported to City
Physician Wheeler, who will conduct
an investigation and take steps to put
an end to the drinking of river water
by the dwellers and campers, and com-
pel them to move farther up the stream.

The appearance of typhoid was re-
ported to the city board of charities
yesterday, and Miss Baldwin, of the

Visiting Nurses' Association, was sent
to investigate. She found one woman
in a two-roomed snow sick in bed, and
two others, a girl 20 years of age and
a boy 7 or 8 years old, sick in a tent
near by. Dr. E. P. Geary was called
and he pronounced them all typhoid of
the worst type. They were removed to
St. Vincent's hospital.

Both families are Russians and the
surroundings of that part of snow town
in which they reside are unsanitary.

The older woman gave the name of
Mrs. J. Kroushinski, the younger one
Miss Rosa Kalandi and the little boy
Frank Kalandi.
