Was in the Wreck.

Frank S. Thompson, whose home was
in the burned district in San Francis-
co, arrived in this city yesterday on
one of the first relief trains. In speak-
ing of the San Francisco earthquake he
says: "The first shock threw me out
of bed, and the building swayed back
and forth, and the windows were shat-
tered. At the second shock it completely
wrecked the house, and screams were
heard on all sides. As soon as I could
get out of the debris I helped carry
some of the women out of the house.
Men, women and children were running
in all directions and everyone was pan-
ic-stricken. All day long the scenes
were horrible. At first the soldiers used

black powder to blow up the buildings.
but this added only to the fury of the
flames, as it would set the buildings
afire. Later dynamite was used, and
Mr. Thompson says had this been used
at first it is his opinion, a greater por-
tion of the business portion could have
been saved. Out in Golden Park thou-
sands of people, scantily dressed, are
hovering over fires. Wood and coal is
being hauled out there, and the once

beautiful park is becoming ruined with
the numerous fires. The mint, which
was supposed to have been saved, is
only partly standing, and some of the
bullion is exposed, but is under guard.
The walls of the city hall still stand,
and hundreds of people are camped
there.

"During the panic women were seen
trying to get their pianos out or some
expensive article, and before they

could finish the effort, they would have
to run from the fire. When the great
Emporium began to burn, it was thrown
open, and hundreds of things thrown
out for the people to carry away. Many
of the stores were thus handled, when
the owners saw that everything was go-
ing."

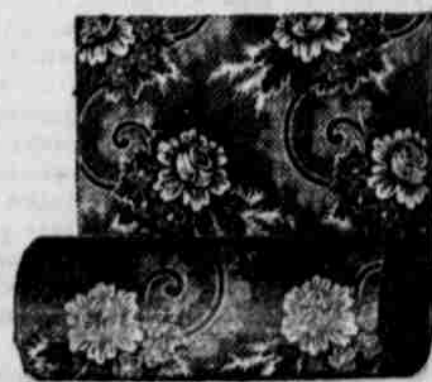
Mr. Thompson says it is a scene he
