Canvassing votes for nominating state and district candidates May 5.
Last day for filing nominating petitions for county offices May 19.
Last day for filing certificates of nomination May 5.
General election June 4.

A PRETTY GOOD TICKET.

The Republican state ticket is a pretty good one, and pretty well distributed.

Eastern Oregon has a judge, Portland has the senator, printer and treasurer. Western Oregon has the governor and the secretary of state, both vote-getters.

With such leaders as Hawley and Ellis up for congressmen, there will be a big vote out.

All things considered, working under a new system, with a light farm vote out, the direct primary made a pretty good ticket.

A CAMPAIGN OF PRINCIPLE.

The Capital Journal has throughout the primary election devoted itself to a campaign of principles—reform principles.

It has fought for the reduction of taxes—state and county. **THIS STATE CANNOT PROSPER WITHOUT MATERIAL REDUCTION IN THE TAX RATE.**

The Journal fought hard against the unjust and arbitrary features of the Tuttle road law. That law will have to be amended.

GERONIMO NEAR DEATH.

Deceitful old Geronimo, chief of the Apache tribe, who has killed more white people than any other living Indian, is critically ill at his home on the Fort Sill military reservation, and can last but a few days.

For the past few months he has grown weaker, but with untold grit he has succeeded in keeping his condition secret until recently.

A few days ago he went to the woods and cut a walking stick. In an hour the news spread throughout the tribe that he was leaning upon a stick for support. They gathered around him and then he revealed his real condition.

When his biographer called upon him yesterday Geronimo said:

"I am praying to the white man's God, who has made me a man fit for heaven, to spare my life for a few years longer, to spare it until I am freed from custody and see my people in free homes."

"God knows my heart is good, but I am telling him my people need me here more than I am needed in a better world."

Geronimo is 70 years old and is living with his eighth wife, whom he married on last Christmas day.

"THE CRIMINAL POOR."

One often hears this harsh expression and it is one that should never be used in print or in conversation. The idea that there is or can be such a thing has its foundation in a wrong conception of humanity.

Following article gives the ideas of a professional man—Dr. Strange, of the Roseburg Spokesman.

He seems to think the difference between criminals and non-criminals is the difference between one and three dollars per day.

But read this article and digest it for yourself, and write us what you think about his statements. Here they are:

"None of the petty crimes that are committed today to get something to

eat, drink or wear, would be committed if the people all had employment at even two or three dollars a day—small enough, God knows. When society is so organized that people cannot legitimately supply their needs, they will commit any crime that under the condition of their mind seems likely to realize their wants. One of the commonest excuses the supporters of the present system hide behind is that everybody can get employment if they want it. That is not true, but even if it were true, at what rate of wages? It is likely that all the present idle could have employment if they would work for ten or fifteen cents a day, but if they did, they would only take the jobs of men and women getting more and they would be turned out without jobs. For every employer has all the work people he wants. Labor is abundant on the market. Again and again you hear men say that such and such a person had a job and couldn't keep it. Every person cannot hold every job that is open. I have employed people and had to discharge them because they were not fitted for the specific work I wanted done. But there is somewhere work suitable to such persons. Given certain kinds of work they would do it well and faithfully. The duty of society is to find suitable employment for each kind of talent. That is nowhere done. We do not find men who are making three to five dollars per day at useful work committing petty crimes. Poverty and bad social conditions are the causes of crime, and crime will disappear when the causes are removed. We Socialists oppose the present system because it fails to put people under such conditions that they can live a full life without being tempted to commit crime as a means of getting such a life—and failing. Every person is fitted to do some useful labor well. Find out what that is and put him or her next to it, and crime will disappear."
